

400 Unsung Heroes Honoured.

Over forty years ago Rotary Club of Forest Hill created a unique award - the RCFH Bert Sloane Youth Achievement Awards, to be given to Year six students attending primary schools in Whitehorse. Over the years the name was shortened to become the RCFH Youth Achievement Awards (YAA).

It's affectionately now called 'the **Unsung Hero** Awards'

This award has gained in popularity to the extent that, to accommodate extra family members, this year TWO award evenings were held.

This year, also, we celebrated the giving out of the 400th award!

In the past week the club has honoured 12 Yr 6 students - one from each of 12 Whitehorse Primary Schools. The first group of six awardees, along with their families, attended an Awards evening and a delicious dinner at Bucatini Restaurant on October 23.

The second group of six awardees and families attended another delightful awards evening on October 30.

Bob Laslett did a great job of Chairing, explaining what Rotary does nationally and internationally. He also explained that the award winners get a framed certificate, a laminated citation, and a \$50.00 Voucher, as well as photos of the event, and publicity for themselves and their school.

Rotary District 9810 Assistant Governor Catherine Elfick gave a very informative talk about the Rotary District 9810 youth programs that students are offered. She also mentioned the Youth Citizenship Awards that our club runs for Year 8 students.

Award Criteria: This award is affectionately called the 'Unsung Hero Award' as the idea is to recognise a student from your school who may not normally be widely recognised in the community for their efforts.

That he/she:

- is a wonderful role model who upholds the school's values
- can be called upon to help the school or colleagues at any time
- has achieved success through application and determination throughout the year
- has made a worthwhile contribution to the school community and/or the environment also
- may not have received many academic or sporting awards but has excelled in other ways,
 ie is an 'unsung hero' who strives hard to succeed and to help others

Yes, these youngsters truly deserve these awards. All are a credit to their families and schools, a success now and in the future. Congratulations to them and their families.

RCFH BLACKBURN STATION CRAFT MARKET – TRADER OF THE MONTH

Jeremy & Mary Ann Furness are locals from Croydon. They sell children's books, oil paintings on gum leaves, and knitted toys in markets at Nunawading, Yarra Junction and of course the Rotary Blackburn station markets. Jeremy started writing and illustrating his Barry the Bike series of children's books over 10 years ago. It is one of the very few children's books that feature classic motorcycles, cars, and trucks. Mary Ann started **oil paintings on gum leaves** as a 15-year-old inspired by paintings by her grandparents. Her grandfather was William Beckwith McInnes who won the Archibald Prize

seven times. These gum leaf oil paintings are as unique as they are beautiful. She paints on specially prepared Tasmanian Blue Gum Eucalyptus leaves which when painted are sealed to ensure a long life. She has been a professional illustrator for the last 40 years working for some of the world's leading publishing houses but now Mary Ann runs Wattle Gum Studios nestled in the Croydon Hills.

Mary Ann started **knitting toys** as a girl and now has turned that pastime into a commercial venture with her beautiful, cute range of animals, fish and birds.


