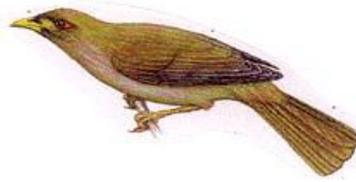

The following decisions were made.

GUEST SPEAKERS Kay Edwards and Glenys Grant.

Kay and Glenys have been involved in the printing of a book of the history of The Burwood Boys' Home and together gave an outline of its 120 years history.

The home was commenced by a wealthy tea merchant, Robert Campbell Edwards, as a home for boys of Melbourne who were homeless during the 1895 depression and developed on what was then country land in Warrigal Road Burwood. An advertisement for assistance placed in a Melbourne newspaper was answered and a committee formed.

Boys up to the age of fourteen were taken in a dormitory type situation and trained in the formation of character to be contributors in a nation's true greatness. Education was of paramount importance so they spent time on reading, writing and arithmetic studies as well as farm activities. After a period of time the place became self-sufficient in fruit and vegetable production.

Over the times the Home's practices have evolved. Now children are placed in a Family home situation with home "parents" and given every day clothes. Assistance is given to families in trouble.

With a name change the organisation is now called Best Chance.

Sergeant's Reflection 23 October


