He, as the official YMCA historian, conveyed to us the story of the YMCA in the theatres of war, from the Boer War to Vietnam. Thank you John for a really interesting and well- presented insight into this untold story.

Last Week's Meeting

We had 11 members, 2 partners (Robbie and Barbara), honorary member and guest speaker John Bindon and Martine McLeod and Barbara Searle in attendance. Sixteen in total. Great to see our TV star Graham plus our recently returned from OS Hawk, Gary come along.

Pres John asked for more assistance for the Blackburn market this Saturday as several regulars will be missing. He advised that Nancy has had a stay in hospital following a fall and needs to take it easy for a while. We all wish you a speedy recovery Nancy.

Mince Pie order from MASH to be emailed out.

Chris attended the District Community and Vocational seminar and this confirmed how much we do. Some clubs do mentoring and mock interviews which we have done in the past.

Glenys advised that nine schools of the twelve invited have so far accepted for our Youth Achievement night on the 28th November.

Ron spoke of the forthcoming programme with our Partners Control night to be next week. He reminded us to bring any stamps and foreign coins in.

Ray and Merle have shifted but Telstra has not as yet connected their landline but mobile and email ok.

Our guest speaker was our honorary member, John Bindon who spoke on the YMCA in Theatre of War. John has done and is doing an amazing job with researching all YMCA personnel who served as representatives in the various wars starting with the Boer war. A total of 970 starting with Martin Madden who was with the Imperial Queensland Bushmen in South Africa in the Boer War.

In WW1 there were 394 YMCA representatives with some serving at the London HQ. The YMCA hostel in Cairo serviced up to 10,000 letters and served 35,000 items of refreshment in a day. One service man declared that it was like "An oasis in a sea of dirt." High praise indeed.

The YMCA organised Christian burials and commenced the Red Poppy fund raising event. Fund raising in Australia financed those working in the WW1 theatres of war.

John is the official historian for the YMCA and liaises with the Canberra War Memorial. He has been able to answer many queries from relatives of the YMCA war veterans.

436 personnel were involved in the WW2 with 3 killed, several wounded and 5 POWS. The YMCA provided entertainment in many Australian camps during the war. John was able to inform the Vice President of the RSL that the YMCA personnel did serve close to the action, served food to Italian POWS and were POWS. The 5 personnel who were POWS in Changi were able to be granted permission to continue serving the other troops as they did before capture. John told of them receiving one bowl of rice per day as their total sustenance, so very grim times. He spoke of a son of one of the Changi YMCA men finding his father's diary and as most of it had to be written with whatever medical supply liquid was available it was unreadable. So John asked the War Memorial if they could help and they deciphered over 130 extra pages of the father's experiences there which the son now has and also the War Memorial.

The YMCA personnel also went to Korea and Vietnam where there were seven representatives and nearly eight as John was due to relieve one of them but the service was wound down before he could go.

What an amazing job John is doing and what a riveting and informative address he gave us. It was a real privilege to be present.

Bill informed us of the upcoming fellowship events starting with Peridot theatre on the 18th November and the list is published later in this newsletter.

Pres John closed the meeting with his usual interesting thought for the week.

Sergeant's Reflection

November is Foundation month for Rotary.

The Rotary Foundation was founded in 1917 by outgoing Rotary International President Arch Klump with \$26-50 and since then has raised over \$1 Billion.

Arch Klump said "We should not live for ourselves alone but for the joy of doing good for others."

In 1929 the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children.

In 1947 it established Ambassadorial scholarships then in 1965-66 Group Study Exchange was established along with matching grants.

1978 Rotary introduced the Health Hunger and Humanity Grants starting with funding the immunizing of 6 million Philippine children against polio.

This led to our polio eradication program being launched in 1985. At that time there were approximately 1,000 new cases per day worldwide and now in 2015 there were only 75 reported in the year and even less so far this year. Over 2.5 billion children have been immunised and we were informed that over 50 million children in India were immunised in one day. Astounding.

It must be totally eradicated otherwise there will still remain a risk to all.

It has taken billions of dollars mainly donated by Rotary, donor governments and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation supported by the World Health Organisation, UNICEF amongst other worldwide health organisations.

The Foundation turns 100 this Rotary year and whilst eradicating polio remains our top priority there are so many worthwhile projects the Foundation supports with District Grants including the school in South Sudan we are supporting which recently was granted \$5,000 to build a bore for the village's water which will also be used for the school both in construction (making concrete etc) and for use in the school toilets and bathrooms.

Our amazing Rotary International.
