Remembering Ford: HBT Scholarships Change Lives

Hand Brake Turn has been radically turning around the lives of disadvantaged youth like Ashleigh and Scott who struggled through or left school early with no hope of employment or training, for many years now. However, after a number of difficult years with reduced government funding, Hand Brake Turn decided last year to be more entrepreneurial and give local businesses, families and service clubs the opportunity to invest directly in the futures of young people at the margins by sponsoring one, five or ten Hand Brake Turn Scholarships.

Already, HBT Scholarships have been sponsored by a number of families, small and medium businesses, philanthropic trusts and foundations, churches and local service clubs including the Forest Hill Rotary Club, who've developed their own innovative approach to remember their founder, friend, colleague and local businessman Ford Davis.

Rather than sponsor an individual from the start of Hand Brake Turn's life-transforming experience, members of Forest Hill Rotary Club established the Ford Davis Endeavour Award which, in addition to sponsoring a place in the first program in Dandenong each year, also includes an award to be made at the Hand Brake Turn Graduation Ceremony.

The winner will be nominated by the HBT Manager, based on his or her full commitment to the course and showing the character strengths that Ford himself personified, including:

- Endeavour to achieve the greatest amount of personal growth and improvement;
- Respect for their trainers and fellow course participants;
- Teamwork in their interactions with others.

The Award will be presented by a senior member of the Club and includes an inscribed Rotary achievement plaque and a certificate of appreciation.

Supporters of Hand Brake Turn and its work with marginalised youth are invited to join members of Forest Hill Rotary Club at the presentation on Friday 11 March 2011 at Hand Brake Turn, Hilton Street Dandenong.

Thanks to those who were able to attend the Whitehorse Council Australia Day Awards ceremony on Wednesday. District Governor David Alexander also attended. Thanks for your support. It was great to see Matthew White receive the award of Young Citizen of the Year; he was our National Youth Science Forum student in 2006. This is not frequent, but it is not uncommon, and sometimes patients even seek the advice of elders etc and then refuse treatment. Our contact in East Timor made extensive efforts to find them but with no luck. The patient reappeared at Dr Dan's clinic. By then the hospital slot had passed and there were no other slot immediately available. Unfortunately, the little girl passed away before another slot could be found.

Regretfully it is a fact of life that most children of the world will not have the availability of the health services we take for granted.

From this angle the article gets that story across but the facts are quite different to what is written.

Timorese girl, 9, dies as doctor pleads for help

A NINE-YEAR-OLD East Timorese girl has died because no Australian hospital would give her a lifesaving operation.

For more than 12 months Dan Murphy, a doctor who runs a clinic for the poor in Dili, tried to persuade Australian hospitals to accept IIa Amaral for surgery to correct her defective mitral heart valve.

"I blame myself first - I was unable to find the words to make things move for her," Dr Murphy said from the Bairo Pite clinic where IIa died four days ago.

A cardiac team from Sydney had offered to go to East Timor to perform the operation but was refused permission to use a local operating theatre.

Dr Murphy asked the US Navy for the use of one of the 12 operating rooms on its hospital ship Mercy when it docked in Dili late last year, but the request was also refused.

After being unable to get a hospital in Australia to accept IIa, Dr Murphy appealed to others in the US and then a small cardiac hospital that is opening in Vietnam but "a massive effort for something ridiculously simple as correcting a small girl's problem failed".

He and staff at his clinic are devastated by her death, which came only months after two teenage patients from the clinic had successful operations in Australia.

Responding to a story in *The Age*, readers helped raise more than \$30,000 to bring the girls to Melbourne for their operations.

Dr Murphy, an American seen as a saint-like figure among the poor in Dili, where he has worked for almost 15 years, attacked "bureaucratic entanglement" in Australia for failing to save IIa.

Money was available through the Rotary organisation ROMAC for IIa to travel to Australia, but Dr Murphy said an intensive effort to find a hospital that would accept her had failed.

Richard Woodburn, ROMAC's operations director, said hospitals gave Australian patients on waiting lists priority over foreign patients, even children.

He said more than 300 children in East Timor required cardiac treatment. "We are exploring the possibility of setting up specialist facilities in East Timor so some could be treated there," he said.

Dr Murphy called for a system that would fast-track help in Australia for Timorese who would die without treatment.

Noel Bayley, a Warrnambool cardiologist who has helped Timorese patients for years, saw IIa at the Bairo Pite Clinic when he visited in November.

He said her situation was more complicated than the two patients from the clinic whose lives were saved in Australia because she needed open-heart surgery.
