LAST WEEK'S MEETING

We had only ten members in attendance but it was a very pleasant social evening.

We dispensed with the planned committee meetings because of our leaders being away. Instead, Stuart Williams gave a report on the International Convention – see below – and Bob Williams gave a very interesting talk on what it's like to walk in the shoes of a physically or mentally disadvantaged person.

Our celebration of Australian Rotary Health Hat Day went very well with members wearing an unusual collection of hats to which some amazing stories were attached. Graham Sharman won the major prize for his tartan cap, hairpiece and glasses combination which, we all agreed, suited him down to the ground!

Ray Smith asked members to bring forward community service project ideas for next year. Ray has a project in mind but would like to hear what other members have an interest in.

Congratulations to our host Ivan Millich and the staff of Bucatini Restaurant. There was unanimous agreement that the meal was superb.

SWAGS FOR THE HOMELESS – ANOTHER UPDATE

You will recall that we also provided Swags to the Salvation Army in Box Hill. They have advised that one of the Swags has been given to a fifty year old man who through circumstances has been left with nothing. He greatly appreciated the fact that the Swag was given to him at no cost and was his to keep.

SNAP SHOTS OF 103RD ANNUAL CONVENTION OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

The 2012 Convention was held in Bangkok Thailand on 6-9th May. At least 35,000 attended representing 157 countries or areas. There were large representations from USA, India, Japan, Philippines, Taiwan, Canada and Thailand.

The convention was held at the IMPACT exhibition centre near the old Don Muang airport. The whole area was under 6-10 feet of water last November. It is a massive centre. Plenary sessions held in Challenger Hall 1 – 200 metres across and 370 metres long. The House of Friendship was held next door in Challenger 2 – just as big.

Security was obvious with airport walk-through scanners when the Princess opened the Convention. A smart card system identified people and the card was read upon entry each time. There were hundreds of assistants/helpers many of who were university students getting a chance to practise their English.

Transport was excellent. 400 coaches were employed to move people around. Hotel pick-ups, and central transfer station and a shuttle service from Sky train station Mo Chit. That trip was approx. 30 min.

A free Sky train smart card was provided – 480 baht on the card. (approx. \$14.50) My card had baht left on it. The Sky train is a superb system- air-conditioned, clean, efficient and user friendly. I chose the Sky-train /shuttle bus option for convenience and comfort.

It was HOT – almost 40 degrees every day – and high humidity. Ave temp in Bangkok for April had been 40.1. Many locals had died of heat stroke. Once inside the Impact centre it was beautifully air-conditioned.

Next year the Convention is in Portugal, the year after Sydney, Australia.

The convention was addressed by Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn Walailak Akra Rajakuman at 9.30 on Sunday morning. This was probably culturally correct but unusual. We were given a list of 10 things not to do, she gave her address in Thai, did not smile once, and the organisers provided no translation. Once she was wheeled off the stage, an announcement was made that the Convention would start in 10 minutes.

The convention flavour and the entertainment was a mixture of Indian and Thai. RI President is Kalyan Banerjee from India. The flag ceremony was impressive and makes one so aware that we are part of a magnificent world-wide organisation that is about doing good in the world.

Australia's Hugh Evans was the first keynote speaker. A young man who made a huge impression. He has hooked his organisation (the Oaktree Foundation) onto End Polio Now.

I was impressed by Gillian Sorensen from UN. She spoke highly of Rotary's humanitarian efforts for 65 yrs.

Angelique Kidjo was second cab off the rank – An African Grammy award singer and activist for girls and women.

Speaker three was Dr Mohammad Yunus, founder of Grameen Bank in Bangladesh – a micro credit bank. In 2009 it had 7.5 million borrowers, 97% of whom are women. He had met with Hilary Clinton the day before he spoke to us.

Day two brought us impressive peace scholar Amanda Martin, then a proud moment when the recipient of the 2011-12 Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award was announced - John Skeritt from Victoria, a member of the Rotary Club of Hampton. His CV was mainly in the areas of medical science, biotechnology and agriculture. Quite a man.

We received a comprehensive update on End Polio Now. Three countries to go – but at a massive financial cost. (Are they creaming off money now that the end is near?) Does the world community and Rotary have the political will to see this project out?

Breakout sessions were held in the afternoons.

I do not attend the "host ticketed events". They are so large and so difficult to pull off. "A boy and a tiger" on the Saturday night I heard was appalling, with many people walking out half way through. It is better to catch up with friends and enjoy the local hospitality.

Think about attending Sydney in 2014. Every Rotarian should experience one International convention.
