Club Meeting 12 November

Warwick organised a special membership night based on one last year. The room was set up with five tables of 4 or 5 with a prospective member at each table with members moving between tables at intervals during the night so the newcomers met most members. Food and wine/soft drink were regularly replenished during the night at a separate table and everyone was encouraged to continually top up their plates. It was finger food comprising bruschetta, a platter of Italian style entrees, dips, calamari, and many different types of pizza. The food was excellent and neither food nor wine ran out through the night. With 13 members, and 9 guests the format worked well.



Bill chaired the evening in his normal relaxed style. He spoke about the “nitty gritty” of Rotary. What Rotary was all about in terms of its presence in the world as a service club, the costs involved including a special deal that we were waving the joining fee for people who had come along that evening, the fact that all new Rotarians had to have a “Working With Children” card which can be done on line, and the value in friendship offered and networking opportunities. Bill pointed out that our fees are cheaper than most clubs and mainly they are due to the annual insurance which covers us whenever we are doing Rotary projects. He explained about our two major fund raisers, the Blackburn Craft Market and the Whitehorse Farmers market and how lucky we were that we got great financial support via the Davis family \$15,000/ year and the Harper Bequest where we spend the interest on \$70,000/ year.

Bill then introduced Pres Mike who kept announcements to a minimum but did tell us that there were 17 going to Peridot this Friday to see “Sylvia” as part of Fellowship. He also mentioned the First Friday Film night which happens..... yes, the 1st Friday of the month surprisingly! He then spoke about the concept of a “satellite” club which needed a minimum of eight members but could start up with fewer and then when it got to eight we could register it officially. It costs the same as Rotary, again because of the cost of insurance. However, they can meet whenever it suits, at a different time, and for a much shorter time ie coffee and cake, and in people’s homes etc.

Bill then introduced Barb W to tell us about the Youth programmes we do as a major club focus under Glenys. He prefaced it with the fact that it was her first talk to the club. Barb gave a very clear rundown of each of our Youth projects including Youth Achievement Awards, the Speech Contest, Model United Nations Assembly held here in Parliament House and in Canberra.



Leanne Pinfold then gave a powerpoint presentation on the Hope Katolo Nursery School project that she and Melanie Haley started in Kenya in 2008 after they had volunteered to go to Kenya in 2007 with World Youth International. Hope Katolo is situated near Lake Victoria in west Kenya close to the Uganda border just about on the equator. It is entirely run with funds from Australia and includes providing two nutritious meals a day, which is usually the only food these children eat in a day. Georgina Malanga had started a small school in a church (actually a hut with earth floor) so she could educate her 3 children. It had no water, no toilets, no trained teachers, and the children were malnourished. There were 47 children. Now, they have raised \$150,000. There are 90 children aged 3-6, each provided 2 meals a day, there are water tanks, a three classroom school, a two pit toilet, fencing for security, a vegie patch, chickens, cows (for milk), a greenhouse, a sick bay, a kitchen with 2 wood fired ovens, \$6,000 a year is paid in wages to the six teachers and three staff (kitchen/security). 180,000 meals have been given, 480 uniforms made, water for 100 people and 200 children have graduated. But, 10% of the children are orphans, 50% are still malnourished, 15-35% of the children are HIV positive. \$50 will sponsor a child for a year, they now have a computer which has improved communication between Australia and Georgina, they need to build some teacher accommodation. They have two film nights at the Balwyn Cinema each year to raise funds. Fantastic project, amazing work by these two young ladies who saw a need and jumped in. Leanne did vet work with Warwick and so our club got involved. Pres Mike closed the meeting while we had tea and coffee. People continued talking for 30 minutes after the meeting closed. The sign of an excellent evening. Now we need some or all of those who attended to join Rotary. We do know that Camille, Glenys's Canadian niece is heading back home with an intention to get her mother to join Rotary.



On this note therefore, this letter serves to inform you that the project's main objective was to construct a community school in order to provide access to education and comfortable/conducive learning environment in which more than 20,000 pupils were projected to benefit and up to date, the construction of the school is completed to the satisfaction of the Diocese. Right now we have four (4) classrooms, six (6) latrines built and borehole in use. The name is already suggested in education cluster meeting which is "Rumbek Friendship School because we narrated how the school came about; so we will add Melbourne to be Melbourne Rumbek Friendship School.

All in all, I apologize for the delay of this communication which I presume caused a lot of inconveniences with our supporters.
