Growing up in Broken Hill, Fiona and her oldest sister were diagnosed legally blind as a result of a degenerative condition. Due to the lack of specialty facilities, she was brought up in the regular school system, learning to adapt and modify what was available.

Fiona talked about her journey, changing her expectations and reaching her goals and challenging limitations.

Using her experience, she set challenges to us all to recognise and change the internal negative conversations we all have with ourselves and to stop and change that conversation to a more positive and thought-provoking dialogue.

Fiona has given herself and others regular challengers not limiting herself by her disability but working out ways to tackling life in a positive way. Instead of letting the negative internal thoughts take over and be overwhelmed with fear and social limitations.

ROMAC NEWS

ROMAC chairman Harold Sharp has given a recent update

The 'patient-free' period provided by COVID has allowed time to update patient records into the medical section of the ROMAC database: ROMAC Connect.

In the past, almost every patient's case was well documented, with photos, media reports etc, but there was no centralised collection system, which we now have in place.

Many of the early records are still in various folders, shoeboxes, 'holding pens' and other databases on other computers.

It is a time-consuming process to add these to the database.

The end result will be worth it as we will then have a much more comprehensive database of all patients treated by ROMAC since our inception in 1988.

IT specialist Richard says there are still lots of gaps in the information and he is asking for help from **host families** and **Rotary clubs** who have been involved in ROMAC over the years to provide him with any records or photographs they may have that he can add to the database.

It's all good news this week. Firstly, this summary of an article by Daniel Mercer, ABC, Rural Australians install record amounts of rooftop solar despite lockdown and supply chain pressures

- More than 3,000MW of rooftop solar was installed by Australian householders in 2021
- The figure was a record and carries on a consistent trend of new records each year since 2016
- Almost one-third of Australian households have solar panels the highest rate in the world
 So, if you have solar panels, you are helping the environment, and hopefully your electricity bills are reducing as well!

Last week I published the environment achievements of two Order of Australia Awardees. So this week, meet New South Wales' Australian of the Year 2022.

Professor Veena Sahajwalla,

Growing up in Mumbai, Veena Sahajwalla witnessed recycling in manufacturing was a great way to live with the environment.

Now a materials scientist, engineer and inventor, Professor Sahajwalla has made her mark by pioneering the high-temperature transformation of waste — turning it into a new generation of green materials and products.

One of her most notable works is the invention of polymer injection technology, also known as 'green steel'.

In 2018, she inaugurated the world's first e-waste microfactory, and created her own green ceramics and plastics microfactories the following year.

"Collectively through our micro actions, we can have a big impact on our environment," she said.

Russell Reichelt is determined to use his honours appointment to raise greater awareness of climate change.

The former executive chairman of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority believes conservation is central to the marine ecologist's message.

He has developed a reporting system that has been adopted by UNESCO to monitor all World Heritage Sites listed for their natural values.

"Climate change is the greatest threat to, not just the Barrier Reef but coral reefs worldwide and so this award has inspired me to work harder to explain that in every forum I can" He said.

"There's a good future ahead if we tackle this with both hands and heart."

The Hazelnut Tree is a small business based here in the eastern suburbs of Melbourne producing handmade soaps and body products. Hazel has been a regular with us at the Blackburn Craft Market for eight years and her products can also be purchased from the "Market Fair" 2/794 Burwood Hwy, Ferntree Gully. She lives just around the corner. At busy times she ropes in her children and husband to help on the stall making it a family affair.

As you can see from the photographs, there is a beautiful unique range of soaps poured and cut by hand. She makes her soaps using the traditional cold process method from olive oil, castor oil, coconut oil, avocado oil and hemp seed oil – no palm oil here. Hazel then uses natural colours, plant extracts and essential oils. The range also includes liquid soaps, shampoo bars, moisturisers, lip balms and more. She has an unscented range for people with sensitivities.
