MEETING REPORT

All members except Ron Brooks were able to zoom in. We had two guest speakers, Vicky Zhouand Danny Chow from LINK Community and Transport. They have been operating for 40 years as a not-for-profit community organisation. Their main clients are the over 65's. They are transported to a range of places and activities... hospital visits, medical appointments and social outings. It also enables people to get back into the community. Recently it has entered into the in-home services field. Their clients come by referrals from Human Services and other government agencies.

They hope to be soon operating from Box Hill and Clayton. They currently operate in the north and west of Melbourne. Their drivers are mainly volunteers. Volunteers also can be Driver Assistants, Outing assistants and social support workers. Volunteers are trained and provided with a uniform. They are expected to work at least one day a week and give a minimum of one year of service. Some have stayed 10 years, while the average is 4 years.

Vicky and Danny tag-teamed well and provided an interesting presentation.

At 7.30 we opened our club meeting. President John called for 2 toasts, RI and Australia.

President John and Bill reported on the site visit to accommodate the Healesville BBQ trailer.

I have organised Una Hobday to be our guest speaker on 21st March Zooming in from Tasmania. The following is from the Action Groups latest newsletter



Harmony Day


When: Sunday March 20, 2 - 5pm

News on Clean Up Australia Day (CUAD).

I believe activity was seen in most parks and creeklands last Sunday.

Blackburn Lake Sanctuary, where I worked, was buzzing with enthusiastic litter gatherers, all armed with longs tongs and gloves. Each group was instructed by

co-ordinator Peter Dempsey as to best practice, safety and other requirements. They were also told to not disturb the soon to hatch turtle eggs - wonderful news!

The comradery was wonderful to see. A bit of rivalry and ribaldry went on as well.

At the end, when each group had brought their bags of recyclable/non-recyclable waste up to be weighed, a number of tired devotees wanted to continue collecting. Instead, everyone stayed at the Visitors Centre, tucked into teas and coffees and chatted.

Talking with one group, the Blackburn Lions, I heard about some of their environmental activities. They are very active, despite their fairly small numbers.

It's encouraging to see many community groups involved in helping the environment in so many ways and, in this instance, keeping our bushland free of rubbish.

Rotarians are certainly not alone in their environmental efforts and it was timely to make it an area of focus.

The final litter total was an average of a kilo per collector.

Litter included masks, lots of polystyrene and, horrifyingly for a very vulnerable bushland setting, cigarette butts and a rat poison trap! Among the many objects found (not included in the weight tally, was a shuttlecock, Christmas baubles, a tablecloth, tennis/ other balls, a foam exercise mat. RCFH BLACKBURN STATION CRAFT MARKET – TRADER OF THE MONTH

THE Bee-autiful BASIN BACKYARD

Nine years ago, Michael asked Meredith for a beehive for his 50th birthday present because he didn't want to keep hand pollinating their trees and plants on their ¼ acre block in the foothills of the Dandenong ranges. Who would have realised that it would lead to a new career and the launch of The Basin Backyard, with over 240 beehives throughout Victoria, 10 regular markets a month, and a shop in Knoxfield (Unit 1, 31 Rushdale St).

Michael & Meredith told me "at the Basin Backyard, we sell pure raw honey & bees wax and related products e.g. lollies containing our honey (eg. honey & eucalyptus drops, nougat & peanut brittle). As well as our beeswax which we make into candles & food wraps. We are the beekeepers so we are hands-on for the whole process, from looking after our *bee-autiful* bees, harvesting the honey & jarring the honey and collecting the wax which is in our products. We are located in The Basin and we have 240+ beehives throughout Victoria. Whilst we have 5 hives on our property, the majority of them are local in the Dandenong ranges and we also have them on properties in NW Victoria, the Mornington peninsula, Gippsland and various other locations in Victoria where our bees can collect different varieties of flora for our different tasting honeys. Come and have a chat to us about our bees, our honey, our wax, our lollies & the value of bees in our environment."

They will organise bee swarm collection, they have bee-keeping supplies. Usefully, you can pay by card.
