

This year, the annual fund raising bike ride for Australian Health Research left from the conference rather than going to the conference because the previous weekend was a long weekend and so finding accommodation was too difficult. The overnight stays are Ararat, Horsham, Hamilton, Warrnambool, Colac and Ballarat.

Ron and the team of 60 left the conference Sunday morning and lunched at Beaufort. Ron reports that they had a tail wind after a chilly start and overnighted at Ararat as planned.

## CONFERENCE REPORT

### **District 9810 Conference Ballarat March 13 to 15, 2015**

Conference commenced with the opening ceremony at 12-30pm on Friday with DG Tony Monley explaining the theme "Eureka" running through the sessions.

The message from RI President Gary Huang was delivered by RIPPR Bill Boyd who as usual was succinct and entertaining. He explained why the matching grants format had to change as it was becoming a "train wreck" and so "Future Vision was lit up". He left us with the thought that if each of the 1.2million Rotarians in the world lit a candle we can light up the world. First speaker, Stephen Monaggetti told us to take control of our destiny and put yourselves in a position to succeed.

He told us that he wasn't considered any good by his little athletics coach but he persisted and only just qualified for the Commonwealth Games by point four of a second.

He said we should continue to evolve and his four "L's" Live, Learn, Leadership, Legacy.

Lt General Peter Leahy, former Army chief, told us about ISIS and cyber terrorism and that in his mind terrorism will be an ongoing issue for a long time but left us with some optimism as he thinks our security is pretty good. Tania Militic is a Rotary World Peace fellow and worked in many places including Cambodia. She spoke of the difference to her life that Rotary's involvement has made.

After each segment a Past DG spoke of their "Eureka" moments from the previous speakers.

OTC (On to conference) Stuart had booked us a private room at the North Britain hotel for our Friday night dinner and we all enjoyed our meals, even though they were a little late due to the very busy kitchen. Judy Marsh did a great job with her ENORMOUS sized meal.

Saturday commenced with RIPPR Bill talking about Rotary Humanitarian projects (water and sanitation) and that he has been told by a US General that our projects do more in the fight against terrorism than all the armies. Prof Paddy Dewan told us about "Kind Cuts for Kids" which is similar to our Interplast project but covers a different geographical area, Bosnia etc. They also teach local surgeons and look at cheaper solutions for equipment. Since starting in 1993 they have performed 3388 operations. He advocates that we have to fight for honesty in medical boards and has personally been involved in several Court cases, all in which he has been proved correct.

James Charles is an Indigenous scholar through our Rotary Health scheme and although initially being illiterate, has schooled himself to enable him to

attend Uni and is a specialist in Aboriginal Foot Health. Over 50% of Aborigines are diabetics which can lead to foot amputation.

We can feel proud as Forest Hill is one of only a few clubs who participate in the project.

DGE David Tolstrup announced that the conference venue next year is Shepparton with no golf day and is 18 to 20 March 2016. The theme is "Power of the Past – Force of the Future" with the Saturday night theme to be your favourite TV show or hero.

At lunch I reminded David that at the last conference at Shepparton (coincidentally my previous time as President) DG Bob Richards opened the conference riding in on a horse in his akubra and drizabone. (Bob was wearing the akubra and drizabone not the horse!)

David said I could be assured that he won't be doing the same! Oooohhhh! Barb West is an intercultural communications expert and was so dynamic. She told us of the many cultural differences between countries and whether we are linear or circular in our communication.

She made us all feel tired just looking at her delivery.

Mark Ballard of Box Hill Central club told us about what issues there are with a lack of sanitation in places such as India. Most difficult for teenage girls entering puberty as they often give up attending school when there are no toilets. He cited 23% drop out at this time and to avoid embarrassment many wait until dark to go to the toilet where nearly 50% of them are attacked.

India has 250 million kids in schools without toilets. Worldwide 4000 kids die each day due to sanitation issues and simply providing water and soap could save 75% of these.

Ken Lay, recently retired Chief Commissioner of Police spoke on family violence and sexism in hospitals as recently raised in the press. There has been a doubling of reportable offences in the past two years with 65,000 reports last year.

He left us with "The standard you walk past is the standard you will accept." Tayla McKechnie is a NYSF past student and wow what an amazing young lady. She spoke so fondly of her time in Canberra and even of meeting a future Nobel Prize winner. She has subsequently been involved in training recent students at NYSF. Her network and confidence has soared with her experience.

Mary Ruth Mendel told us of the Australian Literacy and Numeracy Foundation and that 80% of kids in remote indigenous communities cannot read nor write. Pre prep kids need reading skills taught to them and the Foundation trains High School kids to assist primary school kids to read. Mums and Grandmas also assist. "Share a book" program pushed.

Stuart reminded us that our club was involved in gathering and supplying books to PNG schools through Val Jerrard some years ago and he is checking on what we can do again. Go Stuart!

Fiona David from the Walk Free Foundation spoke of slavery that still exists in the world today with an estimated 36 million in slavery of one form or another in 167 countries. What sad statistics!

60% of our seafood comes from Thailand that uses slavery on some Thai boats so she urged us to learn where our food comes from. Faith Leaders across the world have recently signed a declaration to end slavery.

Anthony Schink is the CEO of the City of Ballarat and showed and told us about their plans for the future as already there are 100,000 people in the area and they are the fastest regional growth area in Victoria. Very reassuring as the plans included listening to residents, connecting neighbourhoods and using people capital.

He left us with "Seeing the Need and Doing the Deed."

Deakin Uni staffer Katey O'Sullivan and students Nikki Griffin, Bonnie Anderson and Lucy Tissot with Rotary's help went to Milawi to assist in teaching the locals to make feminine hygiene products. Their enthusiasm was wonderful. They gained great support within the Uni and raised over \$12,000 when their target was \$5,000. In his summing up, Ken Wall of ABC Dreams spoke of a night time call from them saying they had raised over \$5,000 and would it be OK if they continued fund raising? He said it was a "tough" decision. With Rotary making the sum up to over \$20,000, they were able to build a sewing room with the additional funds. They partnered with "Days for Girls", ABC Dreams, Deakin Uni and Rotary to make it all happen.

Katey told us that "If you want to go fast, go alone but if you want to go far, go together."

Before morning tea we then farewelled the conference riders, including our own Ron Brooks and wished them all the best. Onya bike Ron!

Carol Lawton spoke briefly on what she sees as her DG role in 2016/17.

Kathy Monley updated us on her partner project then the RIPPR and Tony Monley gave us their closing remarks and "Eureka" moments.

The conference handover was next and we closed with an amazing segment with the Melbourne Singers of Gospel, including DG Tony Monley who was looking a bit tired by now.

A very well run three days and as always, very uplifting.
