### RCFH Youth Environment Project

Our Youth Environment project at Forest Hill College is progressing well. Adrienne Baucke, the projects co-ordinator, invited me there this week to meet the VCal year 11 students involved - and what an enthusiastic bunch they are!

We were with Belinda Moody, Manager, Whitehorse Gardens for Wildlife programs, who gave them a talk on the excellent environmental impact of indigenous plantings.

The students are now working on their timeline and their requirements - for instance, what tools they will require, what plant removal is needed and where to get watering and mulch. Some students have already volunteered to look after certain aspects. One is seeking out mulch, hoping to get it for free if possible.

Our plan is to ensure students own the project and not feel we are working out everything for them.

We are helping them with contacts, ideas and options, as well as the budget and will visit them regularly but the final decisions will be theirs.

Next week some members of the Gardens for Wildlife group will be there with us, and the students will break into small groups with them to discuss the plants for the pond and garden beds.

***On May 10 Adrienne and Belinda will attend the Rotary meeting and talk about the project and the impact it will have on the school, students and environment. I invite as many as possible to attend this evening – just let Ray know for bookings.***

### Powerhouse Cheese

Barbara Power started making her own cheeses over 10 years ago. With a degree in Microbiology she had a good scientific foundation to base her production. Two years ago, she started up her own commercial business **Powerhouse Cheese** and persuaded her sister, Donna Hall, who also has a Science degree, to leave her native New Zealand and join her in this venture. These two Artisan Cheesemakers use cow's milk in small 100 litre batches of milk from St David's Dairy in Fitzroy. They sell their cheeses at markets every Saturday and Sunday around the Melbourne area or you can order on line for pick up on Monday afternoon. The rest of the week you will find them busy in their cheesery making their standard Blackburn Blue, Whitehorse White and Ash Bree cheeses or producing new varieties like their Bellbird Blue or a surface ripened Rosella Red which may become another standard offering in the future. Certainly, these two talented very local artisan cheesemakers running **Powerhouse Cheese** have a future.
