Meeting report April 16 2018

The meeting was opened by the acting sergeant Bob W with toasts to Australia and Rotary International. There were only 12 of us present. Bob W then continued sergeant Stuart's tradition of having a "Reflection" (reported elsewhere). He passed the meeting to Barbara S who was occupying the chair tonight. In the reports from the floor we heard that the Blackburn Market two days earlier earned us just \$100. It was so cold and threatening rain that most stallholders didn't turn up, the jazz group stopped playing (fingers too cold), and the club didn't charge the stall holders who soldiered on in cold wind and rain. Glenys updated us on MUNA 5th /6th May. There will be 40 teams with our club fielding two teams representing Jordan and Myanmar. Bob L will look after the Science Experience, and we have a possible two NYSF participants. Members brought along used stamps and foreign coins for our collections. The hot soup was excellent for this cooler weather. Ron reported on a make-up he had done at the RC of Jumeirah, Dubai. John M told us that two NADRASCA ladies have been nominated to receive Pride of Workmanship Awards of \$125 and a certificate to be presented on Tues 17th April. Also, Box Hill Institute have nominated the three apprentices to receive toolboxes this year and they will be coming to our club on May 22nd to receive them. The acting sergeant extracted \$24.60.

We then stopped for meals of steak or fish/chips/salad.



Our guest speaker was Peter McPhee (RC of Mitcham) who chairs Rotarians against Malaria (RAM) who was organised to speak now as it is World Malaria Day on 30th April. He told us there is a target to rid the world of malaria by 2025. Malaria is still endemic in 104 countries claiming the life of a child every two minutes. Bill Gates and Ray Chambers (the UN special envoy for malaria) issued a plan to eradicate the disease by 2040. RAM started its work in the Pacific region over 20 yrs ago Since then the rate of malaria has dropped from 70% of the population to less than 1% in parts of the Solomons and Timor Leste is on track to eliminate malaria in the next 2 years. RAM funds are used for treated bed and room nets which are effective for 4 years (so far they

have distributed 27,500 nets), for breeding ground destruction by spraying and educating children and adults to eliminate pools of stagnant water, provision of diagnostic equipment, and research. There are now 1st stage trials of a vaccine at the Walter & Eliza Institute and 2nd stage trials at Griffith University effective against all four strains of malaria.

Australian Rotary districts have responsibility for the Solomon Islands, Timor Leste, and PNG. In 2000, there were 200 people getting malaria out of every 1,000 people each year. Now there is only 1 in 1,000.

Peter told us he walked the Kokoda trail in 2002 with 18 others. He like everyone else was taking his daily anti malaria tablet. Six weeks later his malaria showed up. He was infected as the tablet is not effective against one of the four strains of malaria, and that is the one he got. The only person in his group to be infected. So far he has had two recurring bouts of malaria, but it also causes regular bouts of sweating and headaches. It also causes the spleen and liver to swell. Ron gave the Vote of Thanks and presented him with a hand- crafted cherry wood pen made by Ray.

The raffle raised \$44. Barbara S won and took home the red wine while Glenys won the white wine. Is it worth anyone else buying tickets?

Pres Bill closed the meeting promptly at 8pm.
