## RI President's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion

Dear Rotary member,

We are dedicated to enhancing your Rotary experience by supporting what is important to you, our members. You have consistently told us that you want Rotary to be a place that celebrates diversity, that fully represents our communities, and that offers all members equitable opportunities to thrive.

You also recognize that embracing diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) will allow us to do more meaningful work while engaging with people who know they'll be valued for the qualities that make them unique. These sentiments were reinforced last year by the more than 31,000 members around the world who responded to our first [DEI survey](#).

To ensure that the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion are ingrained in everything we do, the RI Board of Directors, guided by the DEI Task Force, has strengthened our [commitment](#) to DEI and is [taking action in response](#) to the survey findings.

### Our DEI Code of Conduct

What we say and how we behave matter. Although free expression is important, we must take responsibility for how our words and actions may affect others. The Board has approved a new DEI Code of Conduct to help Rotary members create and maintain an environment that is collaborative, positive, and healthy for everyone.

Simply put, the DEI Code of Conduct asks you to:



- Use respectful language
- Be supportive
- Foster a welcoming and inclusive environment
- Celebrate diversity

All Rotary leaders, from club presidents and district governors to directors and trustees, are expected to apply the DEI Code of Conduct uniformly to help members recognize the impact that their words and actions can have on other people.

If you experience behaviour that does not align with the DEI Code of Conduct, you have ways to respond:

- If the situation can be resolved through discussion, please talk to the person directly. Often, the person who said something or acted in a way that made others feel excluded, marginalized, or targeted did not do so intentionally. Although there might be mistakes, missteps, and uncomfortable conversations along the way, having this dialogue will lead to a better and stronger Rotary.
- If a discussion is not possible or the situation involves someone in a leadership role or another club, contact Rotary's [Club and District Support staff](#), who will review the information and follow up appropriately.
- If you are in danger or your safety is in doubt, contact local law enforcement officers and notify [Club and District Support staff](#).

As an organization, we are stronger when we embrace the diversity found in our clubs and communities. We are more effective when we offer a valuable, inclusive experience that provides equitable opportunities for people to serve, to lead, and to participate with us. To grow Rotary and become a more dynamic organization, we must take DEI seriously. And with your support, we are doing that.

As a Community Representative on The Whitehorse City Council Environment and Sustainability Reference Group (ESRG), I was recently invited to attend a CROWAG meeting, along with the Mayor of CW, Tina Liu, Councillor Prue Cutts, other ESGR Community Representatives, and concerned residents.

CROWAG, as you will know, is the Combined Residents of Whitehorse Action Group.

Tina and Prue gave an inspiring presentation explaining the purpose of Council's **ESRG** which provides a mechanism for Council to consult with key stakeholders, seek specialist opinion and enable community participation in environmental sustainability issues, initiatives, policies and strategies.

One of the key points of interest was that sustainability & the environment spend in CW budget has been growing year on year and that input into the ESGR is to be community driven. If you want to discuss any issues that you would like me to take to this group, please let me know.

The global **City Nature Challenge**, was held from April 29 to May 2. Events took place in each municipality - nine at Blackburn Lake Sanctuary. If you attended you may have seen a large variety of birds.

City of Whitehorse are proposing to separate charges for waste services from general rates on the annual rate Notice.

While this is primarily a decision about rates and the way Council charges for waste services, it is critically important because of the rising environmental and financial costs of waste.

Community feedback will be used to develop a set of recommendations on the Waste Service Charge implementation. There is a genuine opportunity for the community to influence Council's decision-making about the design and implementation of any waste charge.

Mast Gully Nursery stall is operated by Jenny Lee. She has been part of the Blackburn Craft Market for over 20 years, about 5 years after she started her business on 5 acres of land in Upwey. Jenny runs a wholesale flower business during the week but at weekends you'll find her at markets selling plants. She goes to six different markets including Rotary markets at Nunawading, Doncaster and Warrandyte. The plants started as a hobby which soon grew into a business. She has a large variety of potted plants but specialises in helibores and would love to talk to you at the market about her passion for her self-propagated plants which probably accounts for half her stock with the other half coming from nurseries in the Monbulk area.
