## **SPROUTINGS**





Environmentally, it has been a busy few weeks.

As reported before, on April 14 some members of the Whitehorse Environment and Sustainability Reference Group, including community representatives, Mayor Tina Liu, Cr Prue Cutts, and City of Whitehorse staff, met with an influential and concerned local group, CROWAG (Concerned Residents of Whitehorse Action Group), to discuss a strategy for a better consultation process of environmental issues.

A week later the representatives got together to talk about the proposed ESRG meeting agenda and items they wanted to add.

The formal ESRG meeting was on May 18. Agenda items included:

- 1. Sustainability Strategy. Status of current consultation and the planned process.
- 2. Environment and Sustainability Reference Group membership
- 3. Urban Forest Strategy and Whitehorse Planning Scheme
- 4. Standardisation of conditions associated with a Planning application
- 5. Tree Management Database possibility.

We also discussed and agreed that a modified system be put in place to ensure more of the community are now able to voice their concerns, while at the same time get better feedback via the community representatives.

With these slight changes to the system, it seems we now have a good democratic two-way communication which will ensures both groups, Council and Community, are better informed of each other's environmental concerns; what solutions are being contemplated; what actions are occurring and what actions are needed.

It's also given us a much better understanding of some of the enormous environmental challenges the Council, and ultimately us, will face in the future. Unscrupulous land developers are a major issue - but only one of many concerns.

So now we reps feel more positive that we are better representing the Whitehorse community. If you have any environmental concerns, please contact me or another community representative.

I also urge you to keep contributing to 'Have Your Say' on the Whitehorse Website.

At the Whitehorse Woman's Forum Dinner 'Resilient Women' on May 18, we heard from three women on how they have coped with challenges and are helping others.

We were given a Wellbeing Support Card which lists 43 local facilities available to assist women, men, children or families in crisis or dire situations - or just needing some help. These very busy, but always caring, support services cover every type of need. Contact me if you want any more information.



The three speakers all covered different subjects, but a common resilience theme shone through - looking after our own emotional, physical and mental health. I'm sure you all agree - when we look after ourselves, we can better care for others.

One of the major messages was that taking time out in the sunshine, fresh air and environment is a great way of doing this. All these speakers advocated that. One said 'Advocating for nature and the planet is important – nature heals us - and we need to take care of her.'

We can get a release from stress and a sense of well-being by contributing in any way we can to look after the environment.

So Rotary is right on the ball with its newest focus.

On Sunday May 22 an early start to Reconciliation week was celebrated with an event at Blackburn Lake. A Sea of Hands, with handwritten pledges, was planted in the shape of an Aboriginal flag. Below are photos of some of the flags.

Mast Gully Nursery stall is operated by Jenny Lee. She has been part of the Blackburn Craft Market for over 20 years, about 5 years after she started her business on 5 acres of land in Upwey. Jenny runs a wholesale flower business during the week but at weekends you'll find her at markets selling plants. She goes to six different markets including Rotary markets at Nunawading, Doncaster and Warrandyte. The plants started as a hobby which soon grew into a business. She has a large variety of potted plants but specialises in helibores and would love to talk to you at the market about her passion for her self-propagated plants which probably accounts for half her stock with the other half coming from nurseries in the Monbulk area.
