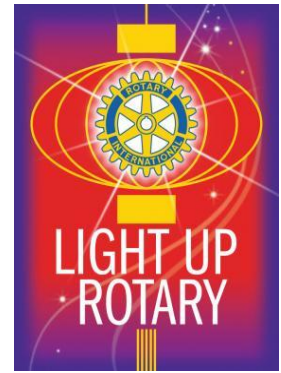

LAST WEEK'S MEETING

As our guest speaker, Catherine Smith was addressing us about road safety I thought I'd give the meeting report a bit of a motoring flavour.

On the Forest Hill Rotary community bus were our guests, Mary, who owns Bucatini with husband, Ivan and Roza whom they nominated for our Pride of Workmanship Award along with the other passengers including honorary member John Bindon plus of course Catherine our guest speaker. Our stand in bus conductor Bob (yes he's that old to remember bus conductors) opened the meeting with a little information on the disproportionate number of road fatalities of young drivers. Our driver, Ray then asked our tour captain Bill to speak and Bill reminded us about the forthcoming District Assembly with five attending. In the latest Australian Rotary Health newsletter, it was reported that Stephen Fisher has become a gold companion reaching total donations of \$10,000. Our secretary Ron advised that he has commenced our annual bowel scan project with 62 kits already sold from our two chemists.

Driver Ray eased the bus into a parking spot and told us that Stan, our veteran passenger who has been going everywhere on the bus for nearly 40 years, left hospital on Saturday but will need more treatment as his "release" was more about him being there for over 5 weeks rather than him being fully recovered. Ticket collector Warwick told us about the wet and cold day Sunday at the Farmers' market (particularly for the unfortunates having to sit inside all morning and put up with having to dry the wet money the outside collectors kept bringing in and having to raise the level of our voices over the loud rain at times – really tough!)

Takings were down but still \$4,855 overall, so very worthwhile. Thanks to our two Eskimos, Bob Laslett and Barb Williams who braved the conditions to rattle the tins on the gate. Robbie Brooks was also to be there but unfortunately had a cycling accident when Ron didn't tell her quickly enough to avoid an obstacle resulting in a painful leg injury. So even though she still wanted to help out she was advised to rest her injury and get back on her feet as Ron is concerned that the ironing is piling up! Passengers Bob Laslett reminded us of the school breakfast tomorrow morning and Glenys sent around the bus a lovely thank you card from Forest Hill High students who attended MUNA. The Youth committee plus John McPhee met earlier with the schools participating in our public speaking contest which will be on the Thursday 6th August this year and she reminded the fellow passengers of our citizenship award night on 25th May.

John McPhee who looks after the Blackburn Station bus run told us that last Saturday the event raised \$652 which was great and we even managed to fit a jazz band on the bus. Driver Ray reminded us of the forthcoming bus route which takes in the Apprentices next week, Citizenship the next run then a run with Handbrake turn on the 1st June. Driver Ray will then take his annual break on the 8th June so there will be no bus run on that date. The Pride of Workmanship Award was then held with Mary coming to the front of the bus to accept a certificate as the employer then Roza was presented with her plaque plus \$500. Roza joined Bucatini in 2012 with no experience in hospitality and as Bucatini recognise her great work she has obviously done really well. Congratulations Roza!

No formal bus conductor session but we had a discussion on footy teams and Ray had to swerve the bus to avoid a downed Hawk, so much so that Gary spilled his wine then Ray had to brake to avoid a Magpie on the road that looked like it had been badly beaten. After all that we got off for a comfort stop and tour captain Bomber Bill conducted a 10 question session which was both educational and obscure with \$30-45 raised quickly from all passengers probably in an endeavour to end the session as soon as possible so we could get onto the bus again for the main part of our trip. Driver Ray had arranged for Catherine Smith to get on the bus to tell us about a Rotary inspired program, RYDA, now called Road Safety Education. She opened with the statistic that each year over 250 young people aged 17 to 25 die on Australian roads and 20 times this number are seriously injured. The program is evidence based and age relevant, does not include shock tactics, works with small groups involving problem solving, reinforces Government messages, evaluates and the facilitators are all qualified, trained and assessed.

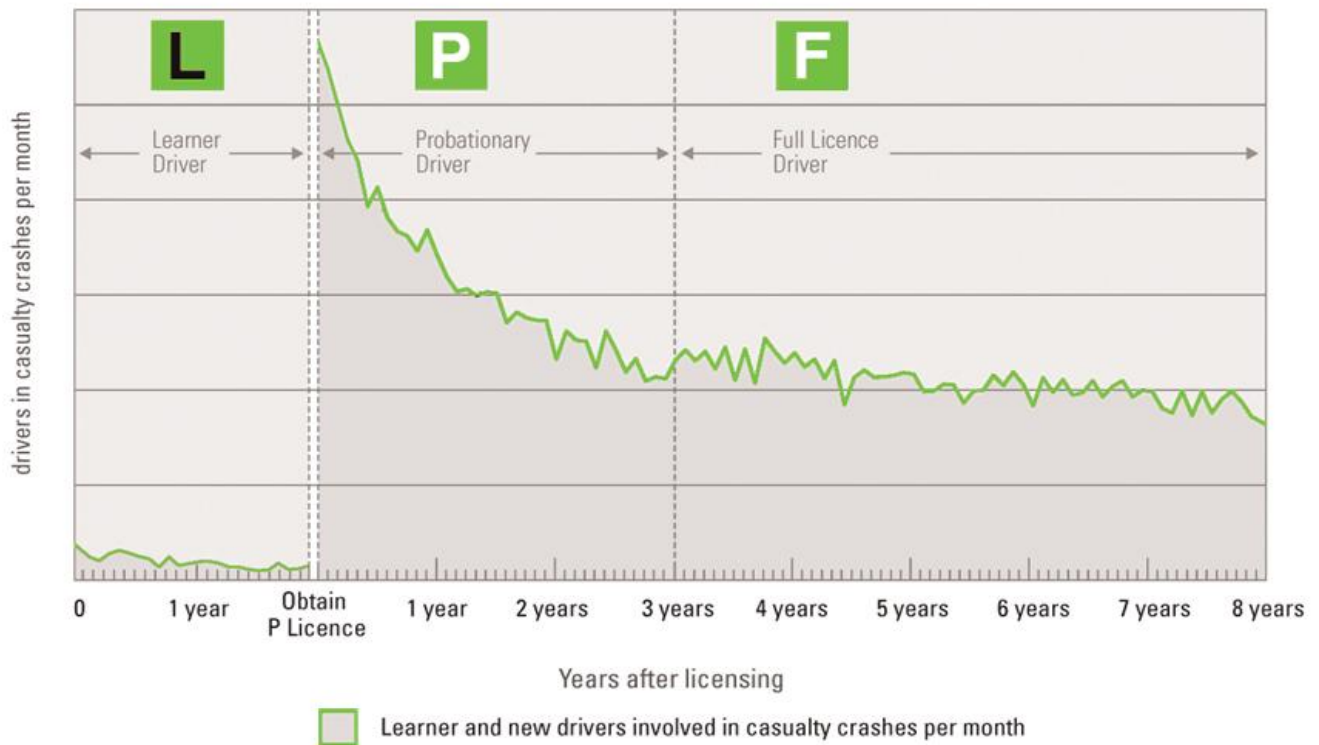
The program was originally developed in conjunction with Rotary and targets year 11/12 students who spend one day out of school and attend six interactive 30 minute sessions which focus on changing attitudes and behaviour. 120 to 180 students can be accommodated at a time at a venue in small group work. The six sessions work on speed, stopping, rights and responsibilities, hazards and distractions as well as what to do if you are involved in a crash. The day starts at 9-30am, concludes around 2-15pm and Forest Hill is in between two metro venues that run the program, Bayswater North and Springvale, so the club is well placed geographically to assist any schools in our area to undergo the program. The club involvement is to promote RYDA in the schools in our area and provide 6 to 8 volunteers to assist on the program days with setting up equipment and hosting student groups.

The cost is \$42 per student which is offset by current sponsors (BOC. Toyota etc) contributing \$17, leaving \$25 net cost. Usually the participant is asked to contribute \$20 with \$5 to find which could be from the Rotary club involved or other means. Led by Ron, there was very positive feedback for the program from members as we all drive on the roads and knowing that any assistance to road safety awareness of young drivers makes the roads safer for us all. Ray's red gum wood pen given to Catherine as a token of our appreciation was very well received. Bill arranged the drawing of the raffle and it was noted that the two winners sat next to Roza and Catherine who jointly drew the winning tickets. \$51 raised. Ray then checked all his mirrors, operated his indicators well in advance of turning and our bus was safely parked ready for our next outing.

ROTARIANS AGAINST MALARIA (RAM)

I read this in my latest report from CSIRO. It could be of special interest to Rotarians and RAM.

What's the most deadly creature in the world? The lion? The shark? In fact, it's a bit of a trick question (do humans count?)... but there is a fair argument that the humble mozzie is the world's top killer.

Many species of mosquito carry deadly diseases such as malaria, yellow fever and west Nile virus. Malaria in particular places a huge health and economic burden on developing countries. According to the World Health Organisation, almost 200 million people caught malaria and more than half a million of them died from it in 2013 alone.

Thankfully, Australian scientists have made a significant discovery that could lead to the development of new tests for diagnosing malaria – potentially saving millions of lives. By identifying distinctive chemicals in our breath, Australian researchers have been able to detect whether someone is infected with the disease.

FOREIGN COINS for UNICEF

So far, the Rotary clubs of Boronia, MASH, Waverley, Sandringham and Nunawading have supplied us with foreign coins to join with ours. Picked up another 3.3 kg of foreign coins and some notes from **RC of Emerald & District** at the last President's meeting. The total now is **104 kgs plus the wad of notes** is getting much larger. Plus, the **RC of Hampton** have told me they are going to collect foreign coins at their monthly Farmers Market (a big thankyou to Kylie McMillan).
