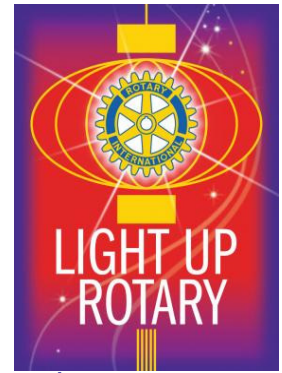

## INTERPLAST FUNDRAISER AT THE NOVA FRI 10<sup>th</sup> JULY at 6:45pm

**Ian Armstrong**, is a Past District Chair of Interplast, and RC of Nunawading. His sister is **Gillian Armstrong** the celebrated Film Producer/Director. Ian has been able to obtain a pre release screening for our Club of her Documentary/Film called "**Women He Has Undressed**" recently written up in the Daily Papers. It is about an **Australian Costume Designer, Orié Keller** who won three Academy Awards. No one in Australia heard about or recognised him for this achievement. **It will be screened on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> July next at Cinema One, at the Nova Theatre, Carlton at 6.45 for a 7PM start.** The Theatre holds 240 seats and it is proposed to sell the tickets for **\$20 each**. Potentially, \$4000 plus! **All profits will go to Interplast** ( in addition to the moneys set aside for my Club's 2015/16 contribution). Ian hopes to have the art work for the brochure and tickets arranged very soon.

### OUT AND ABOUT IN MELBOURNE

**[I would love to receive reports from any readers of visits to exhibitions, cinema, theatre, ballet, days out in the country – I promise they will be published to give ideas where others might like to go].**

#### BALLET

Before each new ballet production of the Australian Ballet, David McAllister, the artistic director, interviews a dancer from that ballet on a Saturday from 5pm to 6pm, cost \$10. Cinderella is the next production and last Saturday Robbie and I heard his interview with Ako Kondo. I recommend these talks, 4-6 a year, not high brow, just a pleasant chat.



Ako was born in Nagoya, Japan in 1991. At three years old she began her training at Shiho Kanazawa Ballet Studio. In 2005 Ako was won second prize at the Japan Grand Prix and in 2006 she studied at The Royal Ballet School's International Summer School. In 2007 she was awarded The Australian Ballet School Tuition Scholarship, which was announced at the Youth America Grand Prix. Ako toured with The Dancers Company in 2008 and in 2010 she joined The Australian Ballet. She was promoted to senior artist in 2014, and principal artist in April 2015 following her debut as Giselle. She now lives with Chengwu Guo, a chinese dancer who became a principal in 2013. We also found out she was a good cook, loves the Melbourne coffee scene,

likes to be noisy and lively and loves the big city life and they have a poodle puppy. I will review **Cinderella** in next week's newsletter.

## THEATRE

Robbie and I also went to the Melbourne Theatre Company's production of **The Waiting Room** by Kylie Trouson. **Kylie Trouson** was a child when her father Emeritus Professor **Alan Trouson** made breakthrough after breakthrough in fertility research. It was 1970s Melbourne and society was divided: was he a hero? Or a mad scientist playing God? The controversy swirled so close to her, yet she was far too young to understand how much was at stake. But now she can see it plain: that when we speak about conception we speak of the most profound things, of family and faith, our lives and our mortality, and our uncertain place in Nature. It grapples with the ordinary wonder of conceiving a child and the extraordinary heartbreak when you can't. Trouson worked with the gynaecologist Prof Carl Wood who with his team in Melbourne helped develop the world's first IVF pregnancy in 1973 and Australia's first test tube baby, Candice Reed, was born in 1980, the first of over 50,000 world wide. William McInnes plays 6 different parts including Prof Carl Wood before and after Alzheimers, Aristotle, Nicholas Tonti-Filippini. **Highly recommended.**
