Meeting Report July 24, 2023

With only 6 members present getting through the reports, etc was a very simple process and most of the 'business' was out of the way before the meal arrived.

Sue was looking for numbers (interest) for the First Friday Film Night and Peridot. If you would like to attend either let Sue know so she can arrange bookings.

Warwick needed a couple of signatures to be registered at the Bendigo Bank in Blackburn South. Bill and Bob will get that done over the next couple of days.

The meal arrived and was suitably dealt with and then Sue introduced our Guest Speaker, Isabel Machuca.



Our meeting took the form of a fireside chat-without the fire. The six members sat around while our guest speaker, Isabel Machuca, outlined the L2P program that she co-ordinates in the cities of Manningham and Whitehorse. This was not a program that any of us had heard about previously and so it proved to be very interesting and like so many good ideas, so simple. The first question that arose was, 'Why haven't we done this before?' The next talking point was just how many people need this program, or a similar one, in order to get a driving licence.

Most of us would think getting the 120 hours of supervised driving time would be pretty simple and straight forward. This not the case for many young people in the community. No car in the family, mum and/or dad don't drive, 2-3 kids around the same age wanting to practise and many more scenarios soon had us realizing what a problem this was for many in the community. Into this space came the L2P program.

The TAC L2P Program is a community base volunteer, assisting disadvantaged Victorian learner drivers aged 16 - 21 with no access to a supervising driver or vehicle to gain the 120 hours driving experience required to apply for a probationary licence.

The TAC L2P Program aims to improve road safety and safe driving practices for learner drivers. It aims to improve education and employment opportunities and for Learner driver participants to engage with their local community and the sense of achievement and independence that comes with a driver's licence.

The TAC program is managed by Department of Transport and delivered by local governments and community organisations statewide. There are 56 programs in Victoria.

- Volunteers are trained
- Matched with a learner
- · Provided with access to an insured vehicle

• Learners have access to professional driving lessons before being matched with an L2P volunteer mentor.

VOLUNTEER MENTOR REQUIREMENTS:

- be over 21 and have a full licence.
- · An interest in helping young people in your community
- Undertake screening process and training provided by your local L2P program.

She has been a professional illustrator for the last 40 years working for some of the world's leading publishing houses but now Mary Ann runs Wattle Gum Studios nestled in the Croydon Hills.

Mary Ann started **knitting toys** as a girl and now has turned that pastime into a commercial venture with her beautiful, cute range of animals, fish and birds.
