Our guest speaker Bob Allardice trained as an engineer and had a variety of experiences before coming to what is now his main focus Rotary Overseas Recycled Playgrounds (RORP). Municipalities replace 5-10% of playgrounds each year. The RORP program salvages metal components and saves councils from putting the excess playgrounds into landfill. The program involves a number of Rotary clubs and districts in dismantling, sorting and dispatching playgrounds to a number of deserving overseas countries and delighted children. Bob is the current chief of the complex process that brings so much joy. The Rotary club of Nunawading receives extraordinary support from John Arena of Arena Gardens and Donations in Kind (DIK). Bob described the process map for the program and key issues such as funding, safety, a storage yard, personnel and destinations. Bob was a fountain of knowledge as well as providing all the tech expertise for his presentation including the RC of Nunawading projector. There were many questions and it was a great night. 

The Community Hub is in full operation seven days a week.

It has a variety of spaces suitable for any community activity.

Spaces include: an indoor stadium, three dance/activity areas with sprung floors, three art rooms and a variety of meeting rooms.

The Hub has achieved a Green Building Council of Australia 5 Star rating Buildings that receive this recognition are built to:

- protect the environment
- emit less carbon in construction and operations
- are water efficient and
- have improved air, light, acoustics and product finishes.

- Gardens for Wildlife want to improve and expand the healthy habitat of gardens for small birds like blue wrens.



New trees in Whitehorse

New trees have recently been planted around Whitehorse to improve the health and wellbeing of the community. Trees also provide clean air and water, improved biodiversity, cooling and shading in the summer and reduced impacts of flooding.

The initiative is part of their <u>Urban Forest Strategy's</u> Vision for a diverse, healthy and resilient urban forest. They are aiming to increase tree canopy cover to 30pc by 2050. Every new tree helps get closer to this. To contribute towards this, Council planted over 3,900 trees in 2021/22.

Powerhouse Cheese

Barbara Power started making her own cheeses over 10 years ago. With a degree in Microbiology, she had a good scientific foundation to base her production. Two years ago, she started up her own commercial business **Powerhouse Cheese** and persuaded her sister, Donna Hall, who also has a Science degree, to leave her native New Zealand and join her in this venture. These two Artisan Cheesemakers use cow's milk in small 100 litre batches of milk from St David's Dairy in Fitzroy. They sell their cheeses at markets every Saturday and Sunday around the Melbourne area or you can order online for pick up on Monday afternoon. The rest of the week you will find them busy in their cheesery making their standard Blackburn Blue, Whitehorse White and Ash Bree cheeses or producing new varieties like their Bellbird Blue or a surface ripened Rosella Red which may become another standard offering in the future. Certainly, these two talented very local artisan cheesemakers running **Powerhouse Cheese** have a future.
