LAST WEEK'S MEETING

17 August - Meeting Report.

Chair Warwick Stott welcomed seven members, and our visitors Acting Assistant Governor Peter Cummins, Hon Member Kevin Grigsby, and Speakers Sonali Wijesinghe and Paul Beddoes from Crossways Lifecare services.

President Bob Williams gave a report on future activities. These include presenting the PSSC trophy to the winning school, Burwood Heights, and the upcoming award presentations to the three winning students. He also mentioned District upcoming events. Next came Program reports, showing the excellent progress the club is making in each area, despite the small membership.

Sergeant Stuart Williams managed to raise \$26.00 from the appreciative audience, and the raffle, \$29.90.

Our Speakers, who are Crossways Lifecare workers, were then introduced.

Paul Beddoes is an experienced Community Worker and the Team Leader of the COACH program (youth and family) at Crossway LifeCare and Sonali Wijesinghe a Social Worker and the Youth Coordinator within the program

C.O.A.C.H stands for creating opportunities and casting hope. It has 18 sites across Australia. It is a community mentoring program which aims to support and provide early intervention for people in our community experiencing life challenges. The programs are both family and youth specific, matching volunteer mentors with young people/individuals in the community that feel they might benefit from this form of support. Through goal focused mentoring, they create space for people to explore their strengths, try new things and step towards a brighter future.

Our Speakers highlighted the following in their work:

- The Counselling service supported 350 clients last year.
- 65 volunteer coaches are involved
- Volunteer coaches are fully trained to provide services
- Coaches meet weekly with their clients for a period of approx. 12 months.
- Coaches see their role as empowering participants to identify and build on their own strengths and to help them visualize a better future
- The service is supported by grants, donations and Bapcare
- The service links with other appropriate services when necessary.

Success of the Mentoring Program is shown in the following statistics from a Survey of 153 young people aged 12-15 across 34 youth mentoring programs.

- 93% now know where to go for help.
- 90% have a more positive view of their future
- 87% feel more confident
- 81% attend school more often
- 70% have a clearer idea of their future pathways
- 78% are less likely to use drugs and alcohol
- 75% know more about the education/training/work options open to them.

Questions followed. Our enthusiastic and dedicated Speakers were thanked and each given a presentation gift of a Ray Smith handcrafted wooden pen.

Cruising the Kimberley Coast

If you want a 10 day break from no television, internet or mobile phones, or any sign of townspeople, cars or buildings, and you want to see nature on a coast, this could be for you. We boarded an expedition ship with about 100 other people, mainly Aussies and Kiwis, at Broome, with the knowledge that there would be some wet landings from Zodiaks, and finished in Darwin. During the trip we saw the 4 Lacepede Islands, being the major breeding area of brown booby birds and green turtles, with no apparent fear of humans; then Talbot Bay which has the 2 horizontal waterfalls, caused by the 11 metre tides rushing through 2 in-line gaps in the sandstone cliffs, being 8 and 12 metres wide with the inside bays being about 6 km square, which at its mid tide is flowing out at about 1,000,000 litres per second, producing bomboras on the downside – we went through when it was just starting to swirl. We next saw Wandjina style aboriginal rock art, and contact art, and on a later day the totally different Bradshaw Gwion Gwion art, which has been dated at over 17,000 years old. We were lucky enough to see the Montgomery coral reef about 80 kms long which is covered by water at high tide, but rises out of the ocean as the tide goes out, producing rivers of water in the ocean, in which turtles abound. We also saw humpback whales and bottle-nose dolphins both of which put on a display for us lasting about 3 minutes. The next day we took a helicopter ride – no doors or safety bars, just seat belts – to the multi-tiered Mitchell Falls, then a Zodiac trip up the Hunter River looking for crocodiles and bird life. Another day took us by boat up the King George River to the base of the huge single drop falls (with no water flow at all at present) but en route dugong were seen, also rock wallabies, and majestic rock cliffs. Our final day took us to Wyndham and Kununurra from where we went to the Argyle Diamond mines (which will close in about 2020 when they run out of diamond pipe). During the

In conclusion, a wonderful trip with about 5 marine biologists and brilliant photographers (including one who worked with David Attenborough in the Arctic) accompanying us at all times including in the Zodiaks and giving talks and slide shows.
