LAST WEEK'S MEETING

We had nine members plus our guest speaker Stephen Fisher.

Sergeant Stuart's reflection was about refugees and will be more detailed below. Ray spoke of Stan being in Bellbird Hospital after his fall at home. He is making good progress but is still unsteady as well as his leg issues so may be there for a little while yet. He is on the 1st floor, room 109 with open visiting hours so he would like to have a chat with anyone who has the time.

As well as our Saturday and Sunday market commitments this weekend we also have our annual sausage sizzle at Schwerkolt Cottage so all the assistance we can muster is needed for Sunday in particular.

Glenys advised we have two students for the RYPEN weekend coming up and Diane Fisher has kindly offered for any of our club members to attend to see what goes on at a RYPEN weekend but with our markets plus Schwerkolt Cottage commitments, I don't think we can take her up on her generous offer. Glenys also advised we will have 3 students to attend the Conoco Phillips Science experience.

Raffle raised \$39 and Sergeant's session \$22-40.

To our very modest guest speaker, Stephen Fisher.

Stephen was looking for a challenge three years ago (my challenge each morning is getting the plastic wrap off the delivered newspaper) and bumped into a mate who had walked the Kokoda Track. He had also listened to Robbie Brooks (wise man!) as she had told him that she and Ron attend the Anzac Day dawn service as "If Diggers made that sacrifice for me, then the least I can do is go to a dawn service." So Stephen also attends dawn services wherever he happens to be, as well as being in the Army Reserve.

Stephen went with a tour company called "Kokoda Spirit" and was part of an all Aussie group of fifteen, many being Rotarians. Each had a local porter plus there were locals who carried the food and tents etc, so 23 locals plus the Aussies.

He drew us back to the Second World War and the importance of stopping the Japanese advance in New Guinea before it reached the Australian mainland. There were 13,500 battle hardened Japanese against initially 1,500 Aussie Militia before they were later strengthened to 7,500. The walk started on the 23rd April and incorporated a dawn service on Anzac Day at Isurava, the location of a major battle. There were approx. 800 in attendance at the service. One of the significant battles at Isurava was at (later called) Bruce Kingsbury Rock where Kingsbury became the only Australian to be awarded a Victoria Cross on Australian soil. He was killed in the action.

Stephen showed us a fabulous array of photos he had taken along the way which of course couldn't possibly show the difficulty of crossing 22 rivers, some raging torrents with the "bridge": being a couple of logs with a rope strung across. He said that he may have been swept away bar for the physical assistance of his wonderful porter, Taylor, who supported him every step of the way. Other smaller rivers were waded across. Overnight camps were in one man tents with long drops for toilets and a hose or river for running water for "bathing" with a fire each night to try and dry out their soaking boots and socks as looking after their feet was, of course a priority. As well as the rivers, 12 kms of very steep muddy climbs up and down added to the 84km long track, making a total of 96kms walked, there were numerous other ways they could break their ankles and legs on tree roots etc so very dangerous as well as arduous.

The walk concluded on the 1st May after 9 days of hard slogging with all in their party completing the walk. Along the way they met Kurt Fearnley OAM who was completing the track for the second time. His first "walk" (he only has use of his arms and is a Para Olympian and so crawled the track – amazing!) was the subject of the TV show "Australia Story."

Many plaques and war memorials along the way with some villages they passed through having communication but very remote with the tour leader carrying a Sat. phone in case of emergencies but as the terrain was so difficult it may have been a day or so before help could arrive. The porters return to their village at the start of the Track once they safely get their party to the finish at Ower's Corner and take three days on their return trip.

Stephen's group's ages ranged from late 20's to the eldest at 73. They raised \$20,500 for Australian Rotary Foundation and he acknowledged our club's contribution to this. We were all in awe of Stephen's achievement and the subsequent questions reflected this as he is a very modest man.

What a treat for us to hear and see his story!

SERGEANT'S REFLECTION

Stuart told us that we are the world's 12th largest economy but only 1/3 of 1% of the world's population. He was taken by the photo in the press of the body of the three year old refugee boy who drowned and was cradled by a Turkish policeman. He urged us as part of the global community to play our role and assist with re-settling some of these unfortunate refugees.

PROBUS REFORMS

Stan is very concerned about the way Probus administration is heading as from their latest report; they have insufficient funds to cover their liabilities. \$167K more in Liabilities than Current Assets.

They spent around \$200K fighting the NZ Probus Clubs and an extra \$153K spent on employee costs despite substantial decreases in clubs and members.

New Zealand Probus clubs were so dissatisfied with PSPL that they formed their own Probus New Zealand Inc which is a low cost operation responsible only to NZ clubs, hence the "fight" with Australian Probus.

Effectively Australian Probus administration is insolvent and the concern is that it will lead to a substantial financial increase sought from all Probus clubs plus rises in the costs of other Probus items.

The Reform Group is working towards overcoming the major problems within PSPL (as they see them) and wants the issue made known to the wider network and as Stan has created about 12 Probus clubs he is, of course personally concerned at the current situation.
