MEETING REPORT & GUEST SPEAKER

Warwick chaired the meeting and welcomed guests – Alma Reynolds, District Governor, Geoff Logie-Smith, Assistant Governor, Greg King, Manningham (End Polio Now). Alma wished Club Forest Hill 45th Rotarv of а Happy Birthday. Alma made the following points, that we are not just a club but should make opportunities and District was there to help make clubs the best. Alma thanked Glenys, Ron and Bob W for their contributions at District level. Geoff was to be the first point of call for District contact. The country is in a deep recession with high unemployment, a lot of financial distress in the community, so the community will need you and your ideas. If your club has significant reserves kept for a "rainy day", that day is now here, for at least 2 years. Club needs to make a plan with goals to work towards, a special activity for the 100yr anniversary of Rotary in Australia and New Zealand. We need to always label a project with Rotary, always wear your club shirt when "working" in the community and take a banner if possible. Our membership growth needs to be successful. Rotary is the opportunity to serve the community and do good things in the world. Make your club more meaningful, find out what people expect from Rotary, look at the RI site which is an "Aladdin's Cave" of Rotary. There is no "right" age to be a Rotarian, every age is good. Engage with the wider world of Rotary, read "Open Doors". There is no hard copy booklet this year so check out other Clubs on the web site. Continue to support Foundation and "End Polio Now" which this year is the DG Partners' project, to which Forest Hill has contributed. On 25 August 2020, the World Health Organisation noted the whole of Africa is clear of polio. So, summing up, make a plan, organise an event for the 100yr anniversary, focus on community projects and label. Make fun. Engage beyond your club.

Greg King spoke on the End Polio Project and again congratulated our club for being one of the first to donate this year and will participate in Rotary's multiplier scheme making our USD \$1,000 into USD \$9,000.

Club Birthday Meeting

Environment – Glenys reported two seminars were attended: One was on the Council's new waste management systems and building innovations for better disposal of waste and better recycling in the City of Melbourne. Lots of suggestions and discussions re recycling etc. The second was run by Whitehorse Council and Parkswide on the Greening of Whitehorse.

An environment questionnaire will go out to the club Membership – Sue reported there will be a 2-stage membership drive.
