Mike's Musings

Travel broadens the mind; the club had the benefit of this on Monday when our own member, Stuart Williams, was able to speak to us about Thailand in an informative and personal way. A single trip to a country or a city rarely gives us more than a superficial idea of what that place is really like for its citizens. It takes some additional study and experience to unlock deeper understanding and knowledge, and Stuart has certainly done that work.

Humans are very adept at coming to conclusions very quickly with incomplete information. We're hard-wired to do so. There are times when this is good practice and times when it does not serve us well: https://www.psychologicalscience.org/observer/snap-judgment-science

As an example, it can be difficult, when recruiting for a job, to differentiate between an applicant who is deceptive or unprepared and one who is simply somewhat intimidated during the interview process. Good candidates may miss out on jobs, and companies may miss out on valuable employees, if interview preparation is poor.

Club Meeting Report 17 September

We welcomed Glenys Coates, Judy L, Margaret McPhee and AG Graeme Aspinall.



Stuart gave an expansive presentation on Thailand. His talk included many colourful and spectacular photos. We heard stories about his teeth, his experiences with Lady-Boys and his visits to Thai homes. We saw photos from many areas of Thailand. South - Hua Hin and Phuket, North- Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai and River Kwai - Nth East Khon Kaen and East - Sisaket where Bum's family live. Stuart was there the day after the old king died, and was also there, a year later, when he was cremated. We heard about the place of the monarchy and religion in Thai life. Did I mention that he talked about lady-boys? His 19 visits enabled him to talk for 70 minutes without notes. It was a memorable night.

The raffle raised \$43 and the Foundation Bowl \$10.85. Glenys and Mike took away the prizes.

President's Reflection:

I approached some missionaries at a train station the other day with a deal. I told them I would attend one of their meetings if they came to one of mine. I gave them a card. I was friendly and polite and honest. I told them they weren't likely to get a convert and that I didn't expect them to necessarily join Rotary. I explained that Rotary was an apolitical, secular organisation that welcomed people from all backgrounds.

The offer was declined. The lady told me that her religion required her to spend all her available time spreading the word – proselytising. No sale.

I considered this more fully only later. If I had gone to one of their meetings, if they'd convinced me that this was the right religion for me and if I'd converted, I assume they'd have encouraged me to leave Rotary. The reverse is not true. I've been repeatedly been told that Rotary should be our third priority, after work and family. The fact is it's even less onerous than that. We're all complex, interesting multifaceted individuals. In this club we have artists, craftsmen, footy fans, writers and world travellers – the list goes on. It's not only not a weakness of Rotary, it's a strength.

I think Rotary is more appealing when it's seen as a vitally important part of our lives, but not an all-consuming one. Service in the aid of helping others is part of a healthy, balanced and well-lived life. Commitments should be sustainable.

On a related note, my daughter joined the new as-yet-unchartered Manningham Rotaract club. She's carrying a heavy load of challenging academic units at Monash, she works at a music store, she does some babysitting, she writes short stories and she socialises with her friends. There are a lot of demands on her time and a lot of things she could do with a few extra hours a week, but I think she knows that this new commitment will enhance her life in a way that other things cannot.

Becoming a Rotarian and working within Rotary is not about replacing the things that make your life great, it is about adding the missing piece, and making it even better.
