

Stuart spoke about Hope Katolo Nursery School as follows:

Rotary international is humanity in motion. Most Rotarians show compassion and humanity. We are proud to do good in the world, in Australia and around the globe. Attempting to eradicate POLIO is probably our proudest project and almost completed achievement.

On a smaller scale, our club has supported the Hope Katolo Nursery school in arid, poverty stricken western Kenya. Our club recently funded the building and installation of two large water tanks. Rotary projects come about in a variety of ways. This project was the brain-child and passion of two local girls, MELANIE HALEY and LEANNE PINFOLD. In 2007, these two young women, volunteered for 3 months in Kenya. Their experiences drove them into action. In this area the children were malnourished, education was but a dream for most and AIDS was prevalent. An amazing local woman, GEORGINA MALANGA, volunteered in a medical dispensary in the mornings and in the afternoon, she taught some local children. She fed these children some rice from what she had left over from her personal ration. Melanie and Leanne bought some land, and started fund-raising for Georgina's dream. Classrooms were built and now almost 100 children are attending this school. There is now a waiting list to enrol. The school has given the children a chance of a better future. Each child now receives one nutritious meal a day. They wear a school uniform proudly and learn to read and write. Our club for a number of years made donations to Hope Katolo, but last year, after meeting Georgina and again hearing an inspiring presentation, we decided to make it a priority project. The water tanks we provided make the school self-sufficient for water. The tanks have saved children a 5 km walk to the river to collect water and have enabled the school to grow more of the food that they use for school meals. Hope Katolo Nursery school is a project our small club is proud of.

Rotary International is an amazing organisation that allows ORDINARY PEOPLE to be involved in EXTRA-ORDINARY PROJECTS AND EXPERIENCES.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

As part of the local Historical Societies celebrations recently there was an excellent talk given at Vermont South library on the History of Vermont. I learned that

in the late 19th century, STEPHENS RESERVE was the site of Uplands, home of builder Edward Bishop. During the 1880s land boom, he built many homes in the area. He was Nunawading Shire Councillor and President from 1887-1893 and became closely involved in Mount Pleasant Methodist Church. Guests at the circuit meetings in his timber panelled dining room feasted on produce including home made pies and cream/butter from his cows. Dr FR Stephens bought Uplands then sold it to the Council in the 1960s when it was given the name Stephens Reserve. It is often mistakenly thought that the name came from the Stevens family, orchardists on land between Canterbury and Jolimont Rds, Forest Hill prior to the 1960s sub division but it is a different spelling.

WHITEHORSE FARMERS' MARKET

Egg and bacon stall

Last Sunday the Rotary Club of Forest Hill manned the egg and bacon stall (as happens once every 7 months). It was a beautiful day and the market had about 76 stall-holders in attendance – a record number – and there was a very large attendance of patrons, enjoying the produce and the weather.

Once again the smell of cooking eggs and bacon brought quite a lot of customers to the stall (although a hot meal was probably not the requirement of some people with the temperature hitting 30 degrees at about midday).

Three teams of 5 cooks, servers and cashiers from our club together with friends and relatives made the work pleasant and the time on duty go quickly.

The egg and bacon stall made a profit of about \$380, whilst the increased number of stall holders who mostly pay \$65 each would have helped to swell the coffers of the market committee.

Finally I would like to thank the Rotarians and partners who helped on the day —without their help we would not be able to operate the stall, and a special thank you to the three others who helped, the daughter of a Rotarian, a friend of hers, and a friend of another Rotarian.
