

LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Our speaker for the evening was our very own orchardist and cattle breeder – Chris Tuck. Chris told us about the World Charolais Conference that he and Jenny attended in Burgundy France. Burgundy is in central France and is approximately 3 hours travel time from Paris. Unlike Rotary Conferences this conference is held every 14 years and one of the reasons that Chris did not want to miss the opportunity to attend. We were told that the Charolais breed is celebrating the 150th anniversary of being registered in the French Herd Book as a specific cattle breed. The conference ran for 10 days and there were lots of things to see and do including visits to farms, a feed producer and an abattoir. Chris was unclear as to whether Jenny accompanied him to the latter.

The animals bred in France are a lot bigger than those in Australia with bulls weighing over a tonne and being nearly seven feet tall in old money. By comparison Australian bulls may weigh up to 900 kg and not as tall. Another difference is the meat requirement in France (fat to muscle content) compared to Australia and other countries. Chris's comment was that the French meat would not be acceptable here. Chris also noted that the size of the French farms is smaller (180 – 550 hectares) and that the neighbours often work in groups sharing equipment etc. The stocking rate per hectare is also lower as the farmer has to grow their own cattle feed because the cattle are kept indoors for four months of the year due to the weather. Chris about discussing it. Chris was able to deduce from conversations that they are coy approx \$100 per hectare and \$100 per cow.

Chris then told us how the breed was introduced into Australia in 1970 through Artificial Insemination; no actual Charolais animals were imported. There are 700 members of the Charolais Society of Australia with 22,000 registered cattle. On a general note Chris mentioned that Queensland and some parts of NSW are in severe drought and the Australian cattle herd is in decline. Beef prices in Australia have also been stable for the last 10 years but production costs keep rising. But before we started feeling sorry for farmer Chris he told us that the US cattle herd is at a 60 year low and they are also facing droughts.

A very informative talk by Chris who is obviously passionate about his Charolais cattle.



The raffle this week raised \$79.50 so we had two prizes not one. John McPhee took a bottle of red and Graham Sharman took home a bottle white wine. Sergeant Stu will be doubly disappointed by the fine session, firstly because we didn't have one and secondly because we just asked for a donation instead and got \$39.70, which is more than he normally raises !!!


Sometime January 2015
