The meeting included presentations on Rotary projects and one in particular that caught my attention was a report by Rob Pelletier, the Flood Coordinator for District 9780 which includes areas like Charlton which was one of the worst hit towns during the flood. Rob noted that one of Rotary's concerns is the mental health of the affected people during and after the recovery phase.

The District is emphasising that it is money rather than second hand goods that is the key need in the recovery. Bob's committee has built a website (http://www.ruralsupport.org/) on which are listed recovery and assistance projects reported by local Rotary Clubs. The website allows other Rotary Clubs to inquire about the listed projects and to negotiate directly with the local club on how they can get together to deal with the project. The website is a clever answer to a key question – where is help needed and how can I help?

It is still early days in the recovery but we will monitor the website in case there is a project we can help with.

We have a big weekend coming up. Blackburn Craft Market on Saturday morning followed by the Whitehorse Farmers' Market on Sunday morning. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered to help. Both markets are in aid of flood relief in Queensland and Victoria so we want the markets to be very successful. It would be great if everyone could attend the markets, either as a volunteer or as a shopper.

Ray Smith and I have just loaded the new barbecue onto the market trailer and rearranged all the other equipment. There is a great need to be able to store the trailer in a garage or shed where it is out of the weather and we have easy access to it. Does anyone know of such a space? Rotary rescues boy

PNG boy Gregory Jack may have only turned seven on Sunday, but he has an amazing story to tell.

As reported by the Moonee Valley Weekly last year, Gregory has been in Australia since last month to receive life-saving surgery for a genetic disorder called Crouzon syndrome.

By luck he was discovered by holiday makers on a remote tropical island east of the PNG mainland more than 12 months ago.

He was brought to Aus-

tralia as part of the Rotary overseas medical aid for children programme and is being hosted by the East Keilor Rotary.

His condition had left his skull and facial bones unable to expand as he grew, and he had been unable to close his eyes.

He required surgery at the Royal Children's Hospital to cut and release his facial bones to bring his face forward.

On Dec 7 Gregory received the surgery.
Rotary member David

Barnes said it was originally feared surgery had not worked when it appeared one side of Gregory's face was not pulling forward.

Onareturn trip to hospital, just days after Christmas, it was found that the frame had also resulted in a broken jaw and widening a crack in his jaw.

But Gregory remains in Australia with his uncle Paison Vilen and the support of Rotary, and now finally appears to be wellon the way to recovery.

Greg has Crouzon's Syndrome where the skull stops growing but the internal organs continue to grow and, seeking the line of least resistance, they force the eyes out and continue with inevitable results. Greg had reached the stage where he had not been able to close his eyes for the last four years.


Attached is a photo showing an apparatus that has screws on the front and his carer has to tighten the screw a mm a day and it forces the front of skull out.

Greg and carer are fantastic as they love to visit clubs.

Greg turned 8 last Sunday and at a BBQ party his carer broke down and cried as he spoke about the debt they had to ROMAC, Rotary and Australia.


