This week's **Rotary Foundation Thought** is about Volunteer Service Grants.

Rotarian Dr Charles Erickson travelled from Nebraska, USA to Zambia in order to provide medical care at an orphanage. Sponsored by Rotary clubs in both countries, Dr Erickson performed haemoglobin determinations on 30 orphans. Nutritional counselling was provided to patients at the local clinic and at general health education sessions. During his month-long stay, Erickson initiated a malaria control program, battling the number one health problem in the area. Through mutual collaboration, the host and international sponsoring clubs have formed a solid partnership and hope to implement many more projects together in the future.
