Please arrange any car-pooling and meet at the farm around 11am for Chris and Warwick to show us around and then lunch at 1 or so.


If any of our members who have not replied or any of our past members want to come, we would love to see you there.

## **Directions to Chris and Warwick's farm**

Go up the Hume Freeway to about the 125km mark where there is a turnoff on the left to Locksley. Travel along this road for about 2km where you will come across the Avenel/Longwood Road alongside the Sydney railway line. Cross both road and rail at Locksley and 10 metres over the rail, turn right onto gravel road labelled Carmody's Road and an arrow to the Gliding airstrip. Travel up the Carmody's Road for 6.43 km with the airstrip on your right. We are on the left side labelled Killara Park at number 643, being the fourth house on the left side – if you get to a house with a sign on the gate saying Poll Dorsets, you have gone too far.

# **Our Club Our Future**

The review group consisting of Glenys Grant, Bill Marsh, Doug Berwick, Ron Brooks and I met for three hours on 1 March 2011 to review the expectations, visions and actions that people contributed during the seminar on 14 February.

Much of the first meeting was devoted to discussing the process we will follow in examining the outputs from the seminar and in developing the strategies needed to implement the changes that members are looking for. It was agreed that the project needs to be completed by 30 June 2011.

We agreed that the group's approach will be to review the output from the seminar and to develop tentative conclusions which it will later discuss with members to get their agreement and support. It was noted that the members need to be involved in the progressing of the project and not just in considering a final report. If necessary, other sub-groups may be formed to examine particular topics.

Conclusions from the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting

1. The club will benefit if members are better coordinated in terms of club activities, better informed about projects being undertaken by Rotary International and the club and more involved in committee and project work. If we can achieve these objectives, club members will get greater enjoyment from their Rotary experiences.

We noted that the objectives can be achieved through a combination of changes in structures and habits. As examples:

- If all of the service committees had regular monthly meetings there would be a greater sharing of information and workloads;
- Directors taking the opportunity during the club reports segment of each meeting to report on their current and upcoming projects. This will inform and enthuse members;
- Organising a formal handover of roles from the current Board to the new Board so information is not inadvertently lost as we move from one year to the next. This process will also greatly assist the members of the 2011-12 Board who have not been on the Board before or in recent years.
- 2. The club needs to grow and to better reflect the age, gender and ethnic mix of our local community.

At present, our club members are almost exclusively male, predominately over retirement age and of Australian/British background. In terms of ethnicity, over 25% of Whitehorse residents speak a second language at home and thirty-five different languages are spoken in the city yet neither Forest Hill nor the other Whitehorse Clubs reflect this mix.

An immediate objective will be to increase the number of female members.

There was discussion about the desired age for new members. It was generally agreed that the desired age would be in the 50-60 age bracket initially. The target age range can be adjusted later in response to the age of new recruits.

3. Greater attention needs to be paid to activities that enable fellowship and friendships to develop and be sustained.

It was noted that fellowship opportunities should;

- Be regularly held during the year;
- Be varied in style e.g. a weekend trip, partners' nights, barbecues, home hosted dinners, etc; and
- Be mindful of the cost to members.

## Meeting report

Last week we had a very interesting talk by Ken Gosbell who has a passion for migratory birds and their travels and habits.

Ken was a civil engineer before retiring and indulging his interest in natural history and conservation.

Ken's talk was accompanied by an excellent slide show which included fascinating pictures of the various birds and the routes they follow as they migrate around the world. The video of enormous flocks of birds circling above the Yellow Sea was fascinating. Migratory birds such as the Red-necked Stint spend most of the year in Australia but migrate to Siberia for the breeding season. They fly non-stop 13,000 kilometres to the Yellow Sea, between China and Korea, where they stop to feed and to replenish their strength. They then continue on into Siberia arriving just as the snow is melting. There they stay while breeding. As to how the birds navigate during their journeys is unknown. The birds follow a fairly constant route as they travel between Australia and Siberia ("the flyways"). Prior to leaving Australia, Stints will almost double their weight in preparation for the non-stop flight to China.

For many years Ken has been involved in a number of projects using different banding techniques to track the birds. Originally, the techniques were simple colour-coded bands attached to the birds' legs but this has now developed into sophisticated electronic tags that enable the birds to be constantly monitored and followed using satellite tracking systems.

It was disturbing to hear Ken's comments on the impact of economic development on the size of the bird colonies. Ken showed photos of mudflats that had previously been key feeding grounds for the birds but are now being drained to form golf courses and industrial land. The result has been a significant declined in the number of birds. It was a pleasure to be able to thank Ken on behalf of the club for an excellent address. Glenys Grant
