DAVID'S DIARY



One of the personal benefits of being a Rotarian is the opportunity to take part in a fascinating experience that is often not available to nonmembers. The graduation ceremony that Graham Sharman and I attended at Hand Brake Turn on 15 March was just such an experience.

Eight young people, including a young lady, graduated from the eightweek course and were presented with certificates and prizes. The young lady won the prize for being best in the motor mechanics section.

It would be fair to say that the ceremony was not what one would normally expect. It was preceded by a very enjoyable barbecue and was held in an engineering workshop – not the flash school assembly hall that one would expect! One or two of the students appeared to have no one to support them and the others were accompanied by a parent, carer or friend.

As each student came forward to receive their certificate, their body language showed they were very proud of what they had achieved - I suspect for a couple of them it was a novel experience to feel proud about themselves.

The HBT manager, Mark Binnington, is an impressive person who has the right balance of caring and practicality needed to deal with young people who have had a difficult time during their teenage years but have now decided to do something about getting a job or apprenticeship and turn their lives around. The other staff – the administrative assistant, the employment coordinator and the instructors in mechanical work, body repairs and spray painting – shared Mark's positive approach.

I presented the Ford Davis Endeavour Award certificate of achievement to Keith Canham who also won an award for his spray painting skill. Keith received the certificate because he had shown a full commitment to the course and had made an obvious endeavour to achieve the greatest amount of personal growth and improvement. Through his behaviour and participation in the course, he also demonstrated respect for the instructors and his fellow course participants and teamwork in his interactions with others.

I also took the opportunity to tell the audience a little about Rotary and our club and how the award commemorated the memory of a great Rotarian.

Graham took a short video of Mark talking about the hand brake program which will be shown at a club meeting in the near future.

Tomorrow will be a big day as we host the Group Study Exchange Team from California. Some of us had the opportunity to hear from the team at the Welcome Dinner held on 16 March.

Stan Harper is still dealing with his health issues. He had further scans last Friday which disclosed no new issues so he expects to go back to the rehabilitation hospital soon and continue his physiotherapy.



Directions to Chris and Warwick's farm

Go up the Hume Freeway to about the 125km mark where there is a turnoff on the left to Locksley. Travel along this road for about 2km where you will come across the Avenel/Longwood Road alongside the Sydney railway line. Cross both road and rail at Locksley and 10 metres over the rail, turn right onto gravel road labelled Carmody's Road and an arrow to the Gliding airstrip. Travel up the Carmody's Road for 6.43 km with the airstrip on your right. We are on the left side labelled Killara Park at number 643, being the fourth house on the left side – if you get to a house with a sign on the gate saying Poll Dorsets, you have gone too far.

SENIOR'S CORNER

An Obituary printed in the London Times - Interesting and sadly rather true.

Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. No one knows for sure how old he was, since his birth records were long ago lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He will be remembered as having cultivated such valuable lessons as:

- Knowing when to come in out of the rain;
- Why the early bird gets the worm;
- Life isn't always fair;
- and maybe it was my fault.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you can earn) and reliable strategies (adults, not children, are in charge).

Common Sense lost the will to live as the churches became businesses; and criminals received better treatment than their victims. Common Sense took a beating when you couldn't defend yourself from a burglar in your own home and the burglar could sue you for assault.

Common Sense finally gave up the will to live, after a woman failed to realize that a steaming cup of coffee was hot. She spilled a little in her lap, and was promptly awarded a huge settlement. Common Sense was preceded in death, by his parents, Truth and Trust, by his wife, Discretion, by his daughter, Responsibility, and by his son, Reason.

He is survived by his 4 stepbrothers; I Know My Rights, I Want It Now, Someone Else Is To Blame, and I'm A Victim

Not many attended his funeral because so few realized he was gone. If you still remember him, pass this on. If not, join the majority and do nothing
