## Meeting Report for 21 March, 2011

Chairman John Donaghey started the meeting with a couple of jokes. He was followed by Bob Laslett who told of the memorable phone call in 1994 that has resulted in many hours of enjoyment through the Science Schools Foundation. Bob has chaired this lively group for more than ten years and he filled the members in on the many and varied characters that have served on the committee. The committee has overseen a program that has enabled more than 40,000 students to experience a hands-on taste of science during the later years of their secondary schooling. Now known as The Science Experience, it has for most of its life been supported strongly by Siemens.

Our well-received guest speaker was Cathy Monley from the Rotary Club of Templestowe. Her topic was Interplast and in an entertaining and fact-filled talk she encouraged us to continue to sponsor this well-worthwhile project. Cathy had accompanied an Interplast team to the Philippines and her enthusiasm for her cause was very evident. She emphasized the training aspects of the program as well as the very necessary surgical procedures that help so many needy people receive self-esteem as well as physical benefits as they recover from burns or cleft palates. She praised the selfless actions of the surgeons and other committed professionals and told of new endeavours to raise funds for this needy cause. Questions flowed despite the evident need for Rotarians to join their partners at the most enjoyable home-hosting provided so generously by Heather and David Bremner.

Sergeant Stuart was very successful in extracting \$38 for the Rotary Foundation. It was another great Rotary evening.

## ANOTHER TSUNAMI NOTE

#### Dear Bob and Heather,

Thank you so much for thinking of us and praying for us. We are all safe including my mother, sister and her family, and Kunio's family. There was a little damage from the earthquake in Yokohama. However, we are under a fear of aftershocks, nuclear affect, and so on.

On the day the earthquake took place, Kunio had to walk home from his office in Tokyo which is 23 km away because all the train system in metropolitan district was stopped. It took 4 and a half hours.

As the nuclear power plants are now in a crucial state, the electricity is stopped for 3 hours every day in Yokohama, too, since our demand sometimes exceeds the supply. It is not just inconvenient but also very frightening when the electricity is stopped between the evening and night time.

I see less items in supermarkets last couple of days. There is delay in delivery as the roads in the northern part are collapsed. Some factories are closed to save enough electricity for the trains and homes.

While I was typing this email, I felt earthquakes twice. I hope the things will go back to normal soon. I am not getting enough sleep.

Thank you again for you email. Please send my love to your family and friends.
