UPDATE ON STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS - PACKAGED GLOBAL GRANTS UPDATE

ROTARY has reached an agreement with two organizations to form strategic partnerships under The Rotary Foundation's Future Vision Plan:

- 1. Oikocredit International, Netherlands-based cooperative financial institution that supports socially responsible investing, and
- 2. Aga Khan University a private, non-sectarian university that promotes human welfare and development through research, teaching and community service.

Through these partnerships, the Rotary Foundation will offer packaged global grants to Rotary clubs and districts in the Future Vision pilot.

Packaged global grants are opportunities for Rotarians to work with the Foundation's strategic partners on predesigned projects and activities funded entirely by the World Fund. These projects and activities support the areas of focus and can include scholarships, humanitarian projects and vocational training.

The partnership with Aga Khan University will allow Rotary clubs to establish vocational training teams with support from Rotary packaged global grants. The teams will enhance

the clinical and administrative skills of health educators at the university's campuses in Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda.

Through the partnership with Oikocredit, Rotary will offer packaged global grants for Rotary clubs to work with micro finance institutions within the Oikocredit network.

Together, these institutions and Rotary club members will identify local needs, develop effective approaches and structure training programs to improve entrepreneurs' business skills.
