DOUG'S DEPUTY'S DEADLINE - 8 August

Our August 8 meeting had two young and contrasting speakers but both with a passion for Rotary Health causes. Jo Beilby, President of Bentleigh Moorabbin Central, brought us up-to-date with Rotary's programs against Malaria (RAM). She told of the district's focus on ridding Timor Leste of the scourge of malaria and the use of the latest social media to promote the program. Bill Gates follows her tweets and she filled us in on the Walter and Eliza Hall's efforts to bring top scientists in the malaria field to Victoria next year with Rotary's aid. Our other speaker, Jahangir Alam, a Rotaractor from Bangladesh, brought to our attention the plight of many children in his country afflicted with club feet. His program, Walk for Life, allows many under one year of age to be cured without surgery by the Ponseti method. The technique uses a series of plaster casts and a specially designed brace. The cause is being enthusiastically promoted by Colin McFarlane and is being supported in our district by the Rotary Club of Boronia. PP Stu Goodman from that club explained how matching grants can be used to raise \$65,000 for the cause.

It was great to have Judy Marsh sharing the meeting with us. It was good to have Graham Sharman back, to hear that Stan Harper is home and Bob Neilsen is enjoying the sun in Queensland. Sergeant Stu extracted over \$34.95 with his customary ease.

Enjoy your week ahead as we all seek to extend our service commitments beyond our own little patch.

MEETING REPORT – 8TH AUGUST – John McPhee

Guest Speakers

JO BEILBY Rotarians Against Malaria. (RAM))

Jo, who has presented to our club previously, was introduced by the Chairman, Ray Smith. Jo spoke on action and planning since her last talk and outlining that the world has been rid of 2 diseases (small pox and one cattle disease) and looks forward to the day when Polio and Malaria can be added to that list.

Malaria is spread by 5 species of mosquito (the females being the problem carrier). Research in the Solomon Islands (through the increased use of microscopic examination) has concluded that incorrect diagnosis has inflated the malaria count considerably causing wasted medical expenditure through incorrect diagnoses.

The cost of a microscope is about \$500 whilst the cost of setting up a clinic is about \$2000. The focus of training staff to work in the clinics is now being directed towards mature females in the outlying areas, as they are more likely to stay and work in that area, whilst young males are more likely to chase higher earnings in urban areas.

RAMs' is now directing efforts to control malaria in Timor Leste, rather than spreading resources over Timor, PNG and Solomon Islands. Much of the finance is through drawing on global funds such as the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and other global funds and in conjunction with WHO.

Promotional support is being sought through involvement with Walter & Eliza Hall Research Institute in the forthcoming world conference of Medical specialists in malaria research and treatment, thus increasing Rotary profile in work within Health and other areas of operations.

JAHANGIR ALAM Walk for Life - The Bangladesh Club Foot Project

Jahangir is a young Bangladesh university student who is employed by the Glencoe Foundation 'Walk for Life' organisation whilst he continues with his studies. Boronia Rotary Club is providing support in the preparation, on behalf of the District, for a matching grant of \$65,000 for the Club Foot Project. Boronia RC is seeking to raise \$6500 to bring this Rotary project to reality.

Club Foot, is a major child health problem in Bangladesh. The project seeks to establish a treatment clinic within 60 km of every village. This should then enable all children born with a foot deformity to be within easy reach of treatment. Treatment requires a series of plaster casts be made and fitted to the leg and feet to straighten the leg, and finally a brace to be fitted for night wear after the straightening process to ensure correction is achieved.

The cost of the foot brace is \$3 (against say a cost of \$200 in Australia). It is estimated that there is an annual need for 5000 to be fitted. To supervise the clinics they will be training 60 physiotherapists. The programme has full Government support, with the Health Minister a doctor/Rotarian, and "Walk for Life" being staffed and managed by Rotarians.

Board Report

The Board reluctantly accepted the request from PP Bob Neilson to step down as Vice President. As members are aware, Bob's health has not been the best recently and a leave of absence will help him to rest and recuperate. PP Bob Williams has agreed to fill the vacancy and we welcome Bob W to the Board. With Bob's experience I know he will be able to help me with words of wisdom and advice and step into the breach when needed (not that I plan to miss too many meetings).

The Board also received reports from the following Committees:

Membership & Recruitment

Ron Brooks attended the District Membership meeting on 3rd August and has brought back some ideas which he will be pursuing with his Committee.

The Committee is also looking at ways to increase opportunities for fellowship that will allow members and partners to meet outside of the Rotary Club meetings. Potential opportunities include Home Hosting, Weekends Away, Theatre Nights, etc.

With respect to Home Hosting Ron has advised the following:

There will be folders coming around at the next meeting asking if you are prepared to host for Home Hosting. Check with your better half and be prepared to commit. It will involve hosting perhaps 3 other couples on Monday night - partners for a meal and members for dessert after 8pm when the meeting is over. There will also be a folder asking if you would be interested in a weekend away. Talk again with your better half and be ready with your answers on Monday night.

VOCATIONAL

A visit is being arranged to the Royal Talbot Rehabilitaion Centre for early 2012, as a vocational event. Likely date will be in February to take advantage of daylight hours.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Swags for Homeless is a possibility for this year and a guest speaker will be talking to the Club in September.
