Again the above example reinforces the need for us to develop an 'elevator speech' of our own. Many versions exist, mainly from U.S. clubs, and they can form the basis of our own unique version. I throw the challenge out to you to do some research and use the resources available to formulate some points to support this very strong and emotive statement - *"To be made a Rotarian is the beginning of a wonderful journey through life"!* I've only just started the journey; you have the examples gained from years of real life experience.

MEETING REPORT – 29TH AUGUST - PP Ray Smith

In giving a talk on e-mail Ron Brooks stressed the importance of courtesy and filing of emails.

Courtesy - check for spelling and grammar, don't use high priority, don't attach large files, use Bcc to protect privacy, don't request receipt, and don't send e-mails to district without having the word Rotary use Reply all sparingly. Large files should be broken into parts and sent as separate files. When sending photos use the computers ability to reduce the file size.

Filing - a very meaningful subject line can assist both the sender and receiver when files are to be retrieved. Folders can be storage places of e-mails if unique names are used for files. In retrieval, files with the same names can be distinguished and placed in order by using letters and numbers in their names. It is helpful to always put the filename in the footer.

I am sure that many members will be further exploring their e-mail handling.

CLUB MEMBER TALK
