In a similar vein of saving lives Ian Coleman spoke to us about Bowelscan. Since its inception it has saved at least 10 lives. Even one life saved means this initiative was worthwhile and we hope that it will continue.



MEETING REPORT

Speaker Ian Colman - Subject Bowelscan

Ian Colman initiated the Bowelscan program in District 9810 in 2003, which has saved over 10 lives. Ian is also the Bowelscan representative on District 9810 Australian Rotary Health Committee.



The Bowelscan program is a long running public awareness program.

Bowel cancer is the most common form of internal cancer in people aged 40 years and over. In Australia, there are about 12,000 new cases and 5000 deaths from bowel cancer each year. In District 9810, 4101 kits have been sold with a return rate of 68% and a positive result of 0.85%.

Early detection of bowel cancer gives you a 90% chance of being cured. Early detection is possible through a simple kit, which you can use at home at a cost of \$6.

With the support of Rotary, for May only pathology processing of returned kits is free.

Ian offered the Club an opportunity to take a leadership role in Bowelscan next year, which focuses on the month of May.

Bowelscan also lifts the profile of Rotary in the community. Chris Tuck
