THE ROTARY DISTRICT 9810 NORTHERN CLUSTER FOUNDATION ROADSHOW

Bob Williams, Bill Marsh, Glenys Grant, Bob & Judy Laslett, Gary Baltissen plus approx. 150 other Rotarians joined me at the Beau Monde International Hotel in Doncaster to hear the work of the Rotary Foundation.

Speakers presented information on:

- The GSE teams that will be going to, and coming from, Texas next year
- District Simplified Grants (DSG)
- Matching Grants

- Foundation Giving including the Centurion Foundation, Paul Harris Fellow and other categories of giving.
- The Future Vision Plan
- End Polio Now

The Rotary Club of Forest Hill was mentioned as one of several Clubs that were successful in receiving a DSG. The Rotary Club of Mont Albert and Surrey Hills was also mentioned for their success in leveraging the \$7,000 raised (in conjunction with several other Clubs) into approx. \$18,000 through a mixture of grants to fund a school project in Fiji.

The Future Vision Plan is currently being trialled and is expected to take effect in the 2013 Rotary year. The main change appears to be simplifying the grants process into 'local' and 'global' (may not be the exact terms but it does represent the intent). However, while the funding pie has now been cut into two pieces the 'local' funds may have to go further. I am sure that more information will be forthcoming as the trial progresses.

Overall, it was an informative night and those attending had the opportunity to catch up with the members of other Clubs. Our Club has volunteered to host the International Cluster meeting in April 2012 so we will be calling on members to assist Glenys and her committee early next year.

AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH HAT DAY FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

Last meeting President Doug mentioned the Australian Rotary Health Hat Day fundraising campaign. Following on from this the District Newsletter outlined the plans Clubs and Districts throughout Australia are putting into place for next year's Hat Day in May 2012. These include:

- District 9810 is looking at selling something like paper hats at the main Melbourne railways stations.
- Districts 9500 & 9520 are running a Hat Day sticker project throughout the districts.
- District 9830 is planning a couple of major events and a number of club events. This could include a Race Day in Launceston.
- The Pharmacy Society of Australia (PSA) has indicated that they will seek the involvement of pharmacies throughout Australia
- The University of NSW was so impressed with their Hat Day event that they have written a testimonial urging all other universities to become involved in next year's Hat Day.
- Local Councils are being approached to become involved, as Penrith Council in NSW did this year. We can possibly approach the City of Whitehorse to seek support.
- A schools kit is being prepared and could be of interest to schools in our area.
- Bunnings in Parramatta NSW participated this year and want to help again (there may be an opportunity to work with our local Bunnings store).

Hat Day to support Australian Rotary Health appears to have huge potential as are the opportunities to support this worthy cause. Things have progressed further since Gary brought this to our attention earlier this year and we have plenty of examples to make it bigger in 2012.

FUNDING OF A MAJOR PROJECT

While on the subject of worthy causes, at its last meeting the Board briefly discussed funding a major project from accumulated Club funds. Suggestions so far include:

- Defying *the Drift* program. The program is similar to the Rotary Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) but is aimed at making young people aware of the opportunities for a career in the country – in essence, the program is trying to stop the drift of young people to the city.
- Australian Rotary Health Indigenous Health Scholarship. The object of this program is to provide a scholarship, which can be used to assist Indigenous students to undertake a course in a wide range of health related professions. It will enable students to use this education for the benefit of other Indigenous people in some of our remote areas.
- Supporting the MASH initiative of providing Drug and Alcohol Booklets into local secondary schools. In our case, it could be Forest Hill College.
- Purchasing a major piece/s of equipment for one of the local hospitals – either Box Hill Hospital or Epworth Private Hospital

If members are aware of other projects that they believe are worthy of consideration they should advise our Secretary – Bill Marsh. Detailed information on the above projects will be provided to members via handout at the meeting on 21st November.
