LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Fourteen members attended the meeting scheduled for committee meetings.

New Sergeant, Stan Harper set the tone for the way the sergeant sessions will be held this Rotary year and raised \$39.75

Warwick Stott talked about his make-up at the Rotary Club of Euroa where the speaker commented on the schooling and grades given to students in a remote Aboriginal town.

In his member's talk, Ron Brooks spoke about his visit to the memorial at Hiroshima, Japan. This is to remember the dropping of the atom bomb there in 1945. He spoke of the story of a five year old Japanese girl who initially survived the blast but a few years later became ill with leukaemia. She had heard that in Japanese tradition making a thousand origami cranes healed things and brought about peace. She made lots and lots of cranes but unfortunately passed away at age twelve. The crane tradition continues and at the memorial are millions and millions of paper cranes. Japanese Rotary World President has Peace through Service as his theme. See Ron's report below.

BLACKBURN STATION CRAFT MARKET

The market went very well last Saturday and we raised \$500. The weather was very kind to us with the result that we had a cool but sunny day for our stallholders and our sausage sizzle. The number of stallholders was down on normal because some had been deterred by the weather forecast. One stallholder told us that his sales were three times higher than normal so he was very happy!

The sausage sizzle went well and we sold two and a bit bags of sausages plus just over half of the extra supplies that we purchased late in the morning.

In summary, it was a very successful market and we again had the pleasure of each other's company and the opportunity to chat to our customers.

Our new Rotary world president is Sakuji Tanaka. He is Japanese.

Our new logo is Peace through Service. On the logo is a folded paper crane. The crane has always been a symbol of Peace, Happiness, Harmony in Japan and Asia. The origami crane has become an international symbol of peace, a Peace Crane, through the sad but inspiring life story of a young Japanese girl named Sadako Sasaki. Robbie & I visited The Peace Park in Hiroshima a few years ago and at the site of where the first Atom Bomb was exploded where we read the legend that anybody who folds 1000 origami cranes will be granted any wish.

Sadako Sasaki was born in 1943. She was 2 when the bomb was dropped. She lived close to where it landed. It seemed she was not affected and indeed, at school when she was 6 she was a very good runner. But when she was 11, she started showing evidence of radiation poisoning and was diagnosed with Leukaemia. She knew about the legend and started folding cranes. Her wish was to get well again. She had made her 1000 cranes. When she died on Oct 25th 1955 at the age of 12. She wanted world peace. She said "I will write peace on your wings and you will fly all over the world".

Her school friends wanted a monument to be built to her and her ideals and enlisted the help of all the Children of Japan. The Childrens Peace Monument was built in the Peace Park and inscribed on the bottom, Robbie and I read "This is our cry, this is our prayer, peace in the world"

Since then people all over the world fold paper cranes and send them to the Sadako's monument in Hiroshima, in memory of Sadako and all children killed through wars. The story of Sadako and her peace monument has inspired many people around the world to work towards world peace. More than 1 million people from around the world visit the Peace Park each year. More than 1 million Rotarians from around the world strive for international understanding and peace. Our Japanese exchange student Sayuri gave us pins with an origami crane. In President Bob's year, we are being asked to work for PEACE THROUGH SERVICE.

Lavena pre-school update





It's finished! And the new name is the Lavena Parrot Fish Kindergarten. The Deakin students returned a few days ago with great stories to tell of the opening ceremony for the pre-school and brought with them some amazing photos and some great video of the children at the school performing 'Daisy Chains' - the ABCD theme song - complete with movement and dance. The finished building has received much praise from the village elders and the chief, the parents, children and the teachers. They really did treat us all like royalty while we were there, and the farewell party for the students was by all accounts very special.





A couple of pictures attached so that you can see the new building, the great murals painted on the walls and get a glimpse of the new playground. An allocation of \$3,000 District Designated Funds has been approved and our application for \$6,000 matching grant has been submitted. Together with the \$5,000 from Deakin, \$1,000 from the Gala Dinner and \$100 from RC Taveuni we will have enough to provide a complete fit out of the new building with places for 40 children to go to the kindergarten. We will also be able to pay for a range of learning materials, stationery, paints, and play materials for the next year. Included in the budget are training places for two new pre-school teachers from the village to enrol at the University of the South Pacific. The Deakin University students will be guest speakers at a meeting soon - please look out for the date and invite your partners, friends and special guests to see what a difference Rotary can make. The Deakin University students will be presenting at RC Templestowe on 8 August - we would love you to invite your members to join us on the evening if you had the time?
