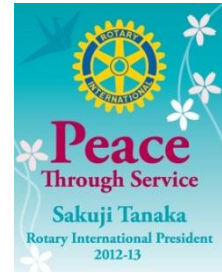

## LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Meeting Report 3rd September 2012

The chairman for the evening Graham welcomed all members and introduced our guest speaker Jeannette Moody CEO from Eastern Palliative Care.

### *Reports from the directors of the Forest Hill Rotary Club*

The Blackburn and the City of Whitehorse Farmers Market operate this coming weekend and every available member will be required. John McPhee brought to the attention of the members that we have a student Paul Kusmanoof who will be speaking in the Four Way speaking competition next Wednesday night 12/9/2012 and we wish him well. Glenys Grant brought the members up to date regarding the upcoming GSE team visit commencing in March 2013 and Chris Tuck advised the members of the next Peridot Theatre in November.

### *Peace talk*

Glenys Grant provided the club talk and spoke passionately about Peace through Service eg Rotary Peace and Aid workers, peacekeepers, Doctors and Glenys highlighted Journalists, Photojournalists and Media personnel. They contribute their service to peace by exposing the truth, reporting the facts and alerting the public to atrocities eg drug lords, degradation of women's rights. Even today in some countries, torture, atrocities, corrupt politicians and massacres still exist.

Dedicated journalists in pursuit for the truth are being targeted by political forces through violence, intimidation, long detention and torture as well as losing their life. Glenys has provided factual information that within the last 10 years over 1000 journalists and photojournalists have lost their lives. Some have disappeared as a result of their profession and shooting assassinations were the highest cause of death.

Figures Glenys provided in 2011 are 86 journalists were killed 58 in their own country, over 1000 others were arrested and some today are still in prison. 2000 media people have been physically attacked. 500 were violently censored, 71 journalists kidnapped, 73 journalists had to flee their own country. Glenys stated the price of freedom. Luckily there will be people who will continue to bring the truth at the risk of their own lives we can only pray their work will not go unnoticed and freedom of expression and democracy is never denied. As I write this report I reflect on all the other innocent people who are being ill- treated by power hungry dictators I thank God we live in our country and have the freedom and are not persecuted for the TRUTH.

Glenys was not the main speaker even though she brought a message of awareness to those who continue to work and help bring peace.

### *Main Speaker*

Forest Hill Rotary Club was very fortunate to have Jeannette Moody CEO of Eastern Palliative Care come and speak to us regarding Palliative care and the answer to the question IF ONLY I KNEW..... Jeannette leads a team of qualified staff of nurses and volunteers who recognise the

special needs for people in dealing with life limiting illness, help making changes making life easier and help in assisting with their quality of their life and dignity finally being prepared for death.

Eastern Palliative Care first formed 1997 in partnership with St Vincent's and Outer East Palliative Care Service and covers a very large area of 2963 kilometres. The majority of their funding comes from government sources 94%- the rest would be from donations. The work EPC provides is enormous and they cover every facet ensuring the care of the patient is paramount with compassion. The work EPC is doing appears to be growing with the amount of new clients approx. 1213 a year. The good news is that the services Eastern Palliative Care are offering is free of charge.

The work that is performed by these specialised people at EPC ranges from special nursing, 24 hour support service, companionship, bereavement support, pastoral care, counselling, emotional needs. I think how important their Spiritual need is. I must say Jeannette illustrates just how a comfort to the families dealing with real life issues of terminal illness. I congratulate Jeannette and her staff for their dedication passion in their work, we can only imagine how difficult it can be for both young and old.

On a brighter note, my impression of Jeannette would be seeing her in her leather jacket riding her motor bike. An angel disguised as a wife, mother of two, as well as a devoted grandmother of two. The Forest Hill Rotary Club thanks her very much.

## PEACE

### Peace through Service

Many world- wide organisations and people are promoting peace thru service- Rotary, Peace and Aid workers, peacekeepers, Doctors without Borders, etc.

Journalists, Photojournalists and Media personnel also contribute their service to peace by spending time in war torn and volatile countries.

They seek to expose the truth, report the facts and denounce abuses. They alert the world public to atrocities like child soldiers, drug lords, degradation of women's rights or the environment. All so that action will be taken.

In some countries torturers abound and there are atrocious deeds, corrupt politicians, and massacres. Without investigative journalists monitoring and reporting these situations in an attempt to preserve and promote peace these events would never be brought to light.

These journalists are always in danger of being targeted by political forces hostile to anyone who exposes them. Because of their commitment to the pursuit of truth they have been exposed to great violence, intimidation, prolonged detention, and torture. They are also killed.

In the past 10 years apparently over 1000 journalists or photojournalists have died as a direct result of their profession, with only about 60 perpetrators being identified and 27 convictions. Not counted are those who disappear, or whose deaths are unclear.

Mortality figures vary slightly according to personnel definitions and circumstances of death, but in 2011 approximately 86 journalists were killed - 58 of these killed in their own country during peacetime. They were victims of corrupt security forces, politicians and business interests.

Shooting assassinations were the highest cause of death.

Over 1,000 others were arrested - and some of those are still in prison,  
2000 were physically attacked,  
500 media were violently censored,  
71 journalists were kidnapped,  
73 fled their own country.

Even bloggers were not safe- 200 bloggers and netizens were arrested, another 62 were attacked and 5 were killed.

The Arab Spring was at the centre of the news.

20 of the deaths were in the Middle East, while 20 others were in Latin America.

Syria, Nigeria, Somalia, Indonesia, Brazil and Mexico were listed as the most volatile.

For the second year running Pakistan was the worst country with 10 journalists dead– 8 of these murdered. No perpetrators have as yet been brought to justice.

China, Iran, Eritrea and Russia continue to be the world's biggest prisons for the media. In these and many other countries governments suppress information they find threatening and do not allow Internet access to their citizens.

Finally - less than 10% of deaths were women, but the ratio per capita was higher than males.

Recently Marie Colvin, celebrated Sunday Times Journalist, was killed in Syria.

Marie believed profoundly that reporting could curtail the excesses of brutal regimes and make the International community take notice. She paid for that belief with her life.

Maria Macias, well known crusader against drugs and editor of a large daily Mexican newspaper, was recently decapitated.

In August female Japanese journalist, Mika Yamamoto, a Peace-award winner, was murdered by Syrian rebels. The three male journalists with her, a Japanese, a Lebanese and a Turk are still missing and so have not been counted in the yearly death toll.

Mika's death brings this year's total of journalists who have died in the pursuit of peace to 86, with a further 31 deaths still being investigated.

Freedom of expression and information will always be the World's most important freedom.

It is the foundation stone of any democracy – yet almost half the World's population is without it – nay is denied it.

As Voltaire said:

## Mr PROBUS

Excerpts from Stan's award letter from Lesley Horn

Stan Harper is more than deserving of Life Membership of the combined Probus Club of Burwood East Inc.

Stan was an outstanding member of Forest Hill Rotary Club (Ed. and still is), serving on a number of committees and district committees. However, Stan's favourite responsibility in Rotary was Probus. He was, and still is known as Mr Probus in both Rotary and Probus worlds. Not only did Stan take on the responsibility of Probus in the city of Whitehorse, he joined the Rotary District Committee for the development of Probus and was chairman for three years. It was Stan's responsibility to seek out and develop opportunities for new Probus Clubs and Stan formed nine new Probus clubs in Whitehorse alone.

In September 1988 Stan saw an opportunity for a club in Burwood East. He made a recommendation to Forest Hill Rotary Club; they agreed and gave Stan a budget to proceed. An announcement of the intention to form a combined Probus club in Burwood East was placed in the local papers and on community radio plus word of mouth through Stan's contacts.
