He likened the DG's visit to that of a school inspector and told a number of tales from his experiences. Sergeant Stan brought out some early memorabilia and was in fine form with his fines raising \$48.75. Vice-President Stuart gave a stirring toast to Rotary International and the President responded on behalf of World President Tanaka.

The Blue Tones morphed into the "Awesome Foursome" as they had the audience's feet tapping in time to their melodies. Bob Williams in his peace talk visited the hall where the Nobel peace prizes are presented and Bob filled in some of the background to these important awards. Our three heroes (charter members Bob, Geoff and Warwick) were duly acknowledged, the candles lit and Kevin led in the singing of Happy Birthday to celebrate 37 years of Rotary service.

The highlight of the evening was District Governor Brian's address. He explained President Tanaka's theme and the significance of the symbols on the banner. He stressed the place of Vocational service and in a professional manner emphasised "Getting Back to Business". He utilised his artistic talents in presenting everyone present with a card to use in helping to get new members. Brian congratulated the club on its achievements. Sue described her project for the Cambodian Children's Fund, showed a very moving video and was presented with a cheque for \$150.

Rotary member talk on Peace

In 2009 when Barbara and I were in Sweden we visited the City Hall in Stockholm where the dinner and dancing is held following the Nobel Prize awards

The Peace Prize is actually awarded in Oslo Norway on the 10th December which is the anniversary of Alfred Nobel's death.

Alfred Nobel of Sweden invented dynamite in 1866 and as this proved to be unstable he later produced gelignite in 1875.

By the time he died in 1896 he had made a fortune and left instructions that most of his money should be used to endow annual Nobel prizes.

According to Nobel's will the Peace prize shall be awarded to the person who "shall have done the most or the best work for fraternity between nations, for the abolition or reduction of standing armies and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses."

Nobel did not leave an explanation for choosing peace as a prize category as he was a trained and successful chemical engineer and categories for chemistry and physics were obvious choices. Nobel scholars suggest it may have been Nobel's way to compensate for developing destructive forces which were later used violently during his lifetime.

The first Peace prize was awarded in 1901 to Henri Dunant, the founder of the International Convention of the Red Cross and the main figure behind the Geneva Convention.

Along with the Peace prize, other prizes are made to those who have contributed most to the common good in the areas of Physics, Chemistry, Medicine and Literature and from 1969 an award is also made for Economics.

The prizes have a large cash award and have been given to organisations such as the United Nations peacekeeping forces which received the Peace prize in 1988 as well as individuals such as Nelson Mandela.

In the earliest years of the Peace Prize – up to World War 1, the prize was often awarded to pioneers of the organized peace movement with many being Parliamentarians working to resolve conflicts on the basis of international law and arbitration.

In the inter war years the focus shifted to active politicians who sought to promote peace and detente by means of diplomacy and international agreements but prizes were also awarded for humanitarian work such as the League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

Since World War two, the Peace prize has principally been awarded to honour efforts in four main areas, arms control and disarmament, peace negotiations, democracy and human rights and work aimed at creating a better organised and more peaceful world.

With recent awards to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate change and to Al Gore in 2007 indicates that the Nobel Committee also embraces efforts to limit the harm done by man-made climate change and threats to the environment.

There have been many notable omissions to the Peace Prize, the most notable being Mahatma Ghandi who was nominated in 1937, 38, 39, 47 and again a few days before his death in January 1948.

Following his death there was no prize awarded in 1948 as the committee deemed that without him there were no other worthy candidates and later in 1989 when the Dalai Lama was awarded the

Peace Prize the chairman of the committee said that this was "in part a tribute to the memory of Mahatma Gandhi."

As well as arms control and disarmament, The Nobel committee believes in humanitarian assistance to the weak and poor and to human rights generally, just like our great organisation, Rotary International.

I therefore applaud Rotary's theme this year of "Peace through service".

Excerpts from Stan's Life Membership Award letter from Lesley Horn (continued)

By February 1999 the response was sufficient to call an Interest Meeting at the Baptist Crossway Centre. This meeting agreed to support the formation of the new club and 80 attendees signed applications for membership. Stan then set up a small steering committee to talk to applicants thought likely to fill positions on the new management team. This involved many, many hours of home visits and discussions.

On March1 the Foundation Meeting was attended by101 people. It was possible to announce a management team and to approve the name, constitution, by laws, joining fees, annual fees and accreditation with Probus South Pacific. Our constitution and bylaws had to take into consideration the needs of a Combined club. Many hours and many meetings were put into developing these documents. We still use the bylaws and guidelines set up by Stan at our foundation.

Our first President was Bob Griffiths, our first Vice President was Sandra Feldman and our first Secretary was Joan Harper. Stan then joined our club, areal bonus for us.

Stan has always been extremely generous with his time and counselling and his wide knowledge and understanding of Probus has helped the Combined Probus club of Burwood East become the great club that it is today.
