Malcolm presented a Presidential Citation to the club from RI for work done at the club last year- Bill received on behalf of club.

Guest speaker Mark Balla- the Toilet Warrior Amazing journey to the toilet Story told at district conference in Bendigo.

Talked to a female teacher who explained she didn't drink water until she got home, no school when teacher had her period. Talked to a local to arrange the building of a toilet - changed the community.

In Mumbai met local community in slum area. Visited a school where no teenage girls as no toilets.



With the help of Mr Toilet the R.C. of Box Hill Central has developed public toilets particularly in India An organisation called "we can't wait" is now incorporated into the World toilet organisation. They have helped developing countries improve. While many areas have toilets not all are functioning, still problem for girls to get access, ratio of children to toilet is very high. Maintenance and cleaning a big issue. No point in organising new toilets without a maintenance/cleaning program.

When Mark joined Rotary he got a district grant and started a program to organise toilets for schools in India. Immediate impact.

Has then applied for a global grant to reach more schools.

Results - stats show teen girls had less absentees, returned to school or stayed at school longer.

President's Reflection

Tonight's speaker is going to talk about the toilet project and the way in which education access and hygiene infrastructure are linked. And I'm going to take just a couple of minutes to talk about my paternal grandmother. She was not a well-educated woman. She'd grown up as the only girl in a household with eight brothers during the depression. She did not have a lot of opportunity in life and she worked until she was quite old. She was an usher in the theatre district in Manhattan. It's not hard work, but it does mean a lot of hours on your feet without breaks when you want them. The two things I can remember her being fixated on when I was a young child were the search for good, strong, portable flashlights – so that she could read the tickets – and her encyclopaedic knowledge of toilets accessible to the public. NYC does not have a lot of them, for some reason. Melbourne is much better equipped. If we were out, she'd be able to tell you where the closest one was. My people don't say 'toilet', of course. We're too delicate for that and call them bathrooms.

She needed that knowledge to exist as a poor person in a city not always kind to poor people. Importantly, she didn't want to have to ask somebody if she could use the toilet. She didn't want to have to be a supplicant. She wanted some dignity. And I think she was entitled to it. I think all people are. When we work on behalf of others, I think it's important to think of it as addressing an imbalance. There is a lack or a deficit that should not exist and we're able to address that deficit. The work we do is not a present or a treat; we're addressing an equity deficit. The smallest move in that direction is worth doing.
