MEETING REPORT & GUEST SPEAKER

Chairperson Stuart Williams opened the meeting at 7.05pm, greeting 12 members and giving a special welcome to Ray Smith after his short spell in hospital.

Speaker. Stuart then introduced guest speaker Daizy Maan, the youngest manager appointed at Deakin, and currently the Manager of the Spark Entrepreneurial Program.

Daizy has had an extremely interesting life and career. At school she formed the first debating team, then participated in MUNA and other Rotary programs including NYSF.

She attended RYLA while at University and was then hired to manage the SPARK program.

The SPARK program is committed to making a difference and designed to bring together a diverse community of entrepreneurs. SPARK supports and promotes new and worthwhile enterprises and ventures. Daizy explained that this is accomplished through SPARK events, workshops and a world class accelerator with up to \$10,000 seed funding, perks from Google, Amazon and Xero and a co-working space in Melbourne.

Daizy then shared some of the 3-minute sales pitch demos from 2019 Startups Day and will send these on to the club.

Her latest venture has been to set up a Wellness centre in Belgrave to help women thrive and grow. A beautiful poem tribute to the Himalayas ended her presentation. Club members then thanked Daizy for her exciting presentation. **Meeting and AGM.** Our meeting included a short AGM, again chaired by Stuart Williams, Board Secretary. Members applauded the appointment of PE John Bindon.

President Sue Ballard formally opened the general meeting with two toasts: to Rotary International and to our great country, Australia.

In her President's address she praised our 40th year YAA student awardees. She spoke of remarkable young Tasmanian student Campbell Remsis, who started Project 365 and who, over the past 8 years, has made 3100 teddy bears for sick children. (See Project365.org) **Reports:**

Whitehorse Council's Interim Climate Response Plan

Council has adopted a **2-year Interim Climate Response Plan** that prioritises actions for council to reduce emissions and build resilience to the impact of climate change for operations, assets and the community. The new Plan builds on the work Council has been doing to mitigate the risks and adapt to Climate Change since 2009. It reflects current science-based projections and will assist council to meet emission reduction targets and ensure we are adhering to the legislative requirements of Victoria's Climate Change Framework and Local Government Act.

Actions include:

- practical programs to help the community to reduce energy consumption
- making Council's buildings more energy-efficient
- support for the development of sustainable transport options
- increasing vegetation cover.

From 2022, Council's climate response will be embedded into all Council policy, including a new Sustainability Strategy which will involve comprehensive community consultation and be informed by the next Community Vision.



What is meant by Global Warming?

<u>Global warming</u> is the slow <u>increase in the average temperature of the earth's atmosphere</u> because an increased amount of the energy (heat) striking the earth from the sun is being trapped in the atmosphere and not radiated out into space.
