UNICEF FOREIGN COIN COLLECTION

The RC of Manningham gave me 2.9kg of coins and some notes including US\$25 at



their meeting last Monday night and Pres
Bob collected 2.2kg of coins from the RC of
Beaumaris at the quarterly Presidents
Meeting last Friday. This makes 14 clubs in
D9810 that have donated coins and notes so
far. That is over \$4,700 worth of foreign
coins and notes already donated to UNICEF
from just a quarter of the district's clubs. So,
I encourage you to turn that scrap metal

into supporting underprivileged,
