Sergeant's Reflection 19 February 2018

We will hear from Rock tonight about his National Youth Science Experience.

I thought I'd remind us of five discoveries made by Australian scientists that changed the world.

Australian scientist, Howard Florey was awarded a Nobel Prize in 1945 for his role, alongside Ernest Chain and Alexander Fleming, in the development of penicillin. Florey carried out the first clinical trials demonstrating penicillin's ability to fight bacterial infections. It is estimated that this discovery has saved over 200 million lives.

La Trobe University's Professor Graeme Clarke whom I met whilst working at Taralye School for Hearing Impaired children, successfully developed and tested the bionic ear in 1978, which is a cochlear implant into the head that captures sounds, converts it to digital code then electronically stimulates the auditory nerve sending messages to the brain. Over 200,000 deaf people have benefitted since.

Psychiatrist Dr John Cade revolutionised mental illness treatment when he discovered lithium carbonate as an effective mood stabiliser for bipolar disorder. Previous to his 1948 discovery the common treatment was lobotomy.

In 1961, Australian scientists David Robinson and George Kossoff built the first commercially practical ultra sound scanner which changed the way medicine used ultrasound technology to diagnose problems of our bodies.

Finally, in 1958 Australian chemist David Warren invented the durable black box flight recorder which records flight data and cockpit conversations. As we know, if a plane comes down the recordings of the box (now coloured orange) can be used to work out the cause of the problem helping with preventative measures for future aircraft.

So Rock, no pressure and I'm sure you'll make a success of whatever career lays in front of you. Bob

HOW TO ASSIST IN THE PREPARATION OF STAMPS FOR SALE:

Stamps are sold by weight – we need margin of about 2mm around each stamp. If the perforations are cut, the stamp is unsaleable.

They need to be on a single piece of paper (not the double corner of the envelope)

It is most helpful if stamps are sorted into:

Foreign

Hi value (\$2.00 & over)

Australian \$1.00 only

Australian commemorative (the large ones) 70c only

Un-franked stamps

All stamps under 70c in value – including concession stamps

All 65c Xmas stamps

Stamps without paper backing (very little value) and need to be removed from all collections to be sold as a separate item.

Stamp albums need to be left intact as this protects the stamps.

If all of the above sounds too difficult, never mind, we will take them any way they come.

(Eric and I use old ice cream containers, marked with the various categories. This makes sorting easier)

To give you an idea of the value of your contribution:

As at Jan. 2018 we receive:

\$15/kg for the \$1.00 stamps – the latest issues of these are always in demand

\$30/ kg for high value and foreign stamps

\$8.00/kg for stamps under 70c

\$15/ kg for 70c commemorative stamps and all 65c Xmas stamps

Stamps are then placed in labelled bags and taken to the dealers.

Most donors post them to us, either in a large paper envelope or a light-weight bag from the P.O. but ask first, just in case we have a contact & can save you postage.
