President's Reflection 11 February

I won't spend much time on the subject of funerals; the experts speaking tonight will be able to do that much better than I. But I do want to just take a segue from their topic, legacy, to talk about the things we leave for others to deal with.

Sometimes what we're left with is a delightful gift. I have a piece of art and a set of saucepans that came into my possession as a result of relatives of mine or my wife's. I use those pots nearly every day. I made oatmeal this morning in one of them.

Sometimes what we leave behind is a burden or a task. My grandmother died without a will. My wife's grandfather died with a house and a five-acre property full of possessions to be disposed of. Somebody needed to sort those things out. A co-worker told me that her mother insisted her ashes be taken back to her hometown in Poland to be scattered. It took a few years to arrange, but she did it.

Keep in mind that these are all applicable even if we haven't died. We're always sharing things with others. We do it every day. And some of those things are gifts and some of those things are jobs. Sometimes the same thing could be seen in two ways. In *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, Mark Twain's titular character manages to convince his friends to whitewash a fence for him, and in fact to pay him for the privilege, by making it seem like he enjoys it.

So maybe, without fully embracing the concept of con artistry, we can appreciate that whether something is seen as a burden or a gift has a lot to do with how our own attitude to it is viewed. Maybe we need to embrace our inner Tom Sawyer to get others to join in. Something to think about.

Marysville visit

Thursday, 7 February 2019, marks 10 years since the devastating Black Saturday bushfires, that burnt out the majority of the picturesque township of Marysville. We were told that only 14 homes remained from over 400.


Bob and I decided to go for a drive to Marysville to check out how "our" garden was progressing.

In May 2009, a group of Forest Hill Rotarians and partners journeyed to Marysville, to help plant a garden, in front of the temporary accommodation for residents of the town who had lost their homes. The accommodation is sited on a block just out town, opposite the golf course.

We spent the day there, planting trees and shrubs, which had been supplied by a nursery.



On this recent visit we noticed how well the plants had grown, in front of what is now Camp Marysville.



The township now has many shops, the bakery, the lolly shop, the police station, a hotel/reception place, to name a few.

We visited the Historical Society, the original of which, was completely burnt out during the fire. The new Historical Society is now housed in a house which escaped the fire. To get the new Historical Society up and running again, word was put out that items of interest of Marysville was needed to start the new Historical Society and the many pieces they received came from near and far, from all over Australia.

Around the town at the weekend, were many "thank you" signs, and yellow ribbons tied around the old oak trees!
