LAST WEEK'S MEETING

The meeting was chaired by PP Ron Brooks who was also raffle boss, sergeant and soapbox orator. His words as he said in his moment of reflection were that he wanted to get on his soapbox about whether Australian society was becoming too concerned about being politically correct. He used the example of South Africa where skin colour naming was not considered a problem, whereas a member of the Opals painted her face brown in recognition of her favourite (w)rapper, and yet she was condemned for doing so. The writer personally agrees with Ron.

Ron also asked how many members had registered with My Rotary and was disappointed that many had had problems so there will be a session at the next meeting to walk members through the process – all members interested should bring their laptops to the meeting.



Ron then welcomed the teacher (Shareen Bottrell) and the students (Anastasia Christakakis, Glenn Low and Jesse Vincent) from Box Hill High School, together with Roger Davis to the meeting.

President Bob then mentioned an email from DG David Tolstrup re the Fijian cyclone, and also said he attended the District Presidents' meeting which discussed district insurance, My Rotary website, the poster about Jackie Chan re polio eradication, Probus, membership website, Ride to Rotary and MUNA

Youth committee chair Glenys mentioned that all four Whitehorse clubs are involved with MUNA and that NYSF forms are available today

Program chair Ray mentioned the up and coming meetings

The Sergeant Ron —oh, him again – fined no-one and just asked for cross fines, and suggested that members put their spare cash in the bowl

Roger Davis then gave a background to the BHHS Scholarship awards and his father, but did ask what has happened to the school song, as he still remembered the words and he gave a reasonable rendition of it. He mentioned that Ford had wanted to give

students an extra push, that they were not for the highest achievers but rather the middle ones who put in a lot of hard work and contributed to the school.

Shareena, the School Engagement Coordinator talked about the differences between her early teaching days and now. There were 400 students then with the possibility of the school closing but now there are 1200 students and it is very competitive. They use two storey portable buildings and it is very selective, and the skill program has helped improve many students, to the extent that 97% of students received tertiary offers, and all other indicators are improving. She teaches psychology, and the school looks after special needs students. The school stresses the importance of a good work/life balance. There are a number of special programs, including one involving global leadership skills, and public speaking skills with humanitarian basis. They are developing a laptop program in place of the lpad program and positive psychology. She intends to stay there for many years. All students here are excellent workers and parents are very grateful. Anastasia then told us that she wished to go into a career in journalism and will do work experience at a TV channel. Her money is going towards the World Challenge Program, a student-led program doing community service in third world countries. This year they are going to an Indian village where they are building a classroom, a new toilet system and a fresh water system for the community

Glenn will be studying zoology and I have no idea what he said as the microphone was not used.

Jesse has been in the Stage Bank (whatever that is, as he could not be heard and this comes from his notes) and he is a drummer and the money will go towards the school fees and a calculator.

The raffle was won by Roger and Ron and raised \$49, and Pres Bob closed the meeting Warwick Stott



The Eastern division of the Order Of Australia Association last week visited the Islamic Museum. As it was extremely interesting I thought you may be interested in hearing a bit about the museum and its aims.





The Museum was opened in 2014 in Thornbury. It aims to showcase the rich artistic heritage and historical contributions of Muslims in Australia and abroad through the display of various artworks and historical artefacts. This is the first centre of its kind in Australia and exhibits a diverse range of Islamic arts including architecture, calligraphy, paintings, glass, ceramics and textiles. Islamic arts date back to the 7th century with the advent of Islam, and include the different artistic styles and cultural influences of various empires that came under Islamic rule, such as Spanish and Persian influences. The Museum also promotes new and established Islamic artists, both local and international and displays travelling exhibitions. After two hour guided tour a delicious traditional lunch was served. All OAM members who attended found it very interesting and informative.
