Guest speaker



Our own member Martine was the guest speaker this week. She reminded us that as we are known by the company we keep, she was a reflection of us. We followed her search for identity at the age of 43, prompted by her birth mother tracking her down. Martine's adopting parents had withheld this information from her but she was fortunate to be able to meet her birth mother, prior to her death. She discovered many brother and sisters and a rich family history. Martine, along with her husband Mac and 30 other Australians, were the inaugural participants of "The Sino Cultural Exchange Programme". They lived on an island called Green Mountain in the Huang Cai District of the Hunan Province in China. The accommodation was purpose built for the occasion and reflected traditional Chinese living. The Hunan Traditional Chinese Medicine Academy presented an introductory course on Chinese medicine, which included topics of acupuncture, massotherapy, theories of Yin-Yang, lectures on Chinese Qi Gong (tai chi) and herbs, to name but a few. While studying in China she had the good fortune to meet Professor Wang Li Ren who had a profound influence on the direction her life would take. He gave her the opportunity to teach English in various districts of Hunan, along with visiting various universities and colleges to give the occasional lecture and to place interested Australians into English teaching positions. She told of some of her experiences living on an island in China where she practised and taught tai chi as well as learning about Chinese medicine and art. Martine has had a variety of work experiences including working in a paint shop in Ringwood, as an interior decorator, in theatre (including a part in Homicide and an audition for Hair). Over the years, Martine has had a variety of work experiences, including, nursing, interior decorating, retail in a paint store, working at the ABC, Reader's Digest and ICI to name but a few. When she was younger she was drawn to acting and appeared in stage plays with a brief sojourn into Homicide and an audacious audition for Hair (the original musical). Ling. She lost her first husband (her soulmate) Mac in 2001 and her second husband, David in 2012 who developed Lewy Bodies Dementia. Martine values the support of her close friends and family, including son-in-law Mike. She shared her passion for gardening and included a DVD featuring flowers from her garden backed by haunting music. This, she said, was the first piece of music she performed to in public since taking up ballet.

Martine was presented with a pen crafted by Ray for her fascinating talk.

Sergeant Reflection 20 March 2017

Yesterday I attended a fund raising lunch at Yarra Valley Anglican School for a Rice Meal run by the Footman club and MCeed by a mate of mine, Graham. You pay \$30 to have a meal of plain rice and water as so many in the world are lucky to have even that. Graham had asked me a couple of weeks ago if my Rumbek South Sudan school building mate Sam could fill in as one of the two guest speakers had pulled out. Sam was available as was Cameron who is the chair of our school building committee.

The first speaker was Peter Faulkner from Endeavour Hills Rotary club talking on Disaster Aid and we were chatting to him before the event started and he was saying that Disaster Aid sent 200 tents to South Sudan recently and they are lost and do we have any contacts in South Sudan who may be able to help him which of course we do so maybe we can help him find the tents. Peter told us in his presentation that Disaster Aid asks what is needed before sending the aid so if only tents are needed then only tents go. Also they now provide permanent shelter in countries that haven't experienced a crisis using local suppliers so helping the local economy. Amazing work they do.

An auction was next with a bottle of soy sauce raising \$1200 then our sumptuous lunch of a quarter of a bowl of plain rice and a glass of water. Yum!

Sam then spoke of his escape from the war with 20,000 other "Lost Boys of South Sudan" in 1989. After being bombed, shot at, being eaten by crocodiles while trying to cross rivers, drowning and starvation 12,000 reached Kenya to a camp where they stayed for 12 years. Sam was 10 when he arrived there. He spoke of their daily food which was a bowl of maize and each boy was given a week's worth of maize which most had finished by day 3 or 4 so they went hungry for the rest of the week. He showed photos of life in the camp.

I looked around the room and everyone was hanging on each word. Total silence.

Most of the boys were migrated to Australia and most of these to Melbourne.

Cameron then told the story of Sam's dream for a school in his home village of Rumbek which was in the Flyer. With the school's walls built we have been trying to send further funds there via the Catholic Diocese account we have been using in Kenya. This is needed to put the roof on before the wet season commences later this year, but the Commonwealth Bank have been instructed by the Govt to discontinue sending any money from Australia to Kenya so we are stuck at the moment.

Sam's and my previous employers the Good Shepherd Sisters do have Sisters in South Sudan so I'm endeavouring to see if they can help us get our funds there.

Finally, at the end of the day Sam was like a celebrity with many wanting to have their photo taken with him and Ringwood Rotary who were there want him to come and speak to them at hopefully a joint meeting with their cluster clubs who happen to be the cluster I am taking care of next year as Assistant Governor so I'm sure that can be arranged.

Rotary Youth Driver Awareness (RYDA) day-21 March

Barbara W, Ray, our good friend of our club Hans and I, helped out at the RYDA day last Tuesday. The school was Wellington Secondary College with 250 students participating so Ringwood Rotary provided five helpers too as nine were needed altogether.

We each had 25 or so students plus a teacher and I was allocated the Green group so I had a green folder for my group to follow. As usual there were six sessions, with my group starting with "The "I" in Drive" about knowing yourself, self control, risk awareness etc, then we had "Road Choices" pointing out the legal issues drivers faced such as alcohol limit, how to avoid fatigue etc.

Morning tea (always a good session) then onto "Genevieve's story" which was a video followed by group discussion on a crash of a young woman driver who killed her passenger and herself by over correcting after she overtook a slow vehicle in the Yarra Valley and the "ripple effect" on her family, friends and work colleagues. We then ventured outside for "Speed and Stopping" with three driving instructors showing us how long it takes to stop with a car doing 40km then 60km and what to look for in safety features when buying a car etc.

Lunch with the instructors and teachers was provided while the students had brought their own and ate separately. We then had "Hazards and Distractions" which showed the group the dangers of even having your mobile phone in reach whilst driving plus so many other avoidable dangers and distractions and how to minimise them. Our final session was "After the Crash" with Anat, who survived a major crash but is now brain damaged and a paraplegic needing 4 carers each day for the rest of her life. She crashed after swerving to avoid a dog on the road after just completing her Uni degree and had a great life in front of her, before her crash left her so damaged. She was understandably difficult to hear at times but her message was delivered to a very quiet and receptive audience who listened to her every word. What a gutsy young lady to make herself available to speak to these young "L" drivers who could see face to face what a simple poor decision on the road can lead to.

Catherine the fantastic RYDA coordinator summed up the day, thanked everyone and singled out we Rotarians and friends for not only making our time available to help these young drivers, but for believing in the program. As I say to anyone whom I talk to about the program, you never know, but maybe one of these young people who has learned to be a safer driver from the RYDA program may be driving towards you or me one day. 
I encourage you to Start tipping now. You can complete round ONE tips now, and miss the rush before the first game. You can log in later and modify your tips if need be. HOW TO TIP
