Meeting Report 26 March

Meeting was attended by 13 members and 2 guests.

The sergeant's session raised \$28.70 in fines, and the raffle raised \$50.00 even.

First draw in the raffle was won by Barb Williams.

The guest speakers for the night were Reg Sheil and Warren Sparrow, from Angel Flight. The charity was started in 2003 by Bill Bristow, a successful Australian businessman who was the Australian of the Year in 2005 and has been awarded an OAM for his services to Australia in recognition of his work in creating the Angel Flight charity. He was a pilot and plane owner, and wanted a way to make use of a resource sitting idle, help people, and provide an opportunity for volunteers to be able to witness the impact their efforts had.

Angel Flight focuses on helping Australians in rural and regional areas who must travel long distances to access specialised medical services unavailable where they live. Long journeys by car or train can be exhausting and expensive for the patients and their families, and the stress and anxiety can be an impediment to their being given the best chance at recovery.

The charity has low overheads of about 15 per cent, and a very small staff of six in a single office. The office staff coordinate up to 20 round-trips per day, and manage a volunteer network of about 3000 pilots and 4000 drivers from their headquarters in Fortitude Valley. Clients are referred to the Angel Flight organisation by the medical professional who is treating them.



The volunteers, both sky and land-based, are compensated for the fuel used, but nothing else. Most pilot volunteers own their own small planes, and make themselves available by signing up for 'missions' to bring specific patients to their destination on a specific day and time to attend their appointments. Volunteering for a mission is not a guarantee that a driver or pilot will be assigned that mission, but many volunteers for Angel Flight have been able to make trips with the same patients over multiple missions, sometimes this may be hundreds of trips.

Reg and Warren work mostly between Essendon Airport and the Albury area, but have also traveled to other areas in Victoria, including Mallacoota, and some parts of NSW, including Merimbula and Hay.

The planes are often small, and can be affected by bad weather, which means that sometimes flights are cancelled or delayed. The size of the planes also puts the patients in very close contact with the pilots. The drivers also develop an emotional bond with the patients and families. Warren spoke of waiting with the partners or parents of a patient during medical appointments. Not all patients recover, and while it can be very emotional for a volunteer to know that a patient they've come to know well has passed away, neither Reg nor Warren believe that remaining dispassionate about the people they help is possible. There is an emotional care component to the volunteering, in addition to the practicalities of logistics. Angel Flight receives no government funding, nor does it have a fundraising department. Direct donations by individuals, bequests, and some corporate support provide the money Angel Flight needs to keep going. Sometimes, the community in the town where an Angel Flight client lives will host a fundraiser to maintain support for the organisation.

"The captain of the Australian Cricket team is the most important job in Australia"—we were told by an ex-Prime Minister. The young man who held that position was the best player of his generation. Why would he indulge in such inappropriate behaviour? Was it a brain fade or something much more sinister? Should Cricket Australia and we have seen this coming? The Australian team for a few years has been hated and disliked around the world. Aggressive fast bowlers have been mouthing off at the batsman after almost every ball. It has been—win at all costs.

This incident has become huge because we see it damaging the integrity and honour, not just of cricket, but all Australian sport. Oh, the shame. Many times, when scandal and skulduggery has been exposed, Australia sets itself piously above the fray. Cricket Australia has to be aware that cheat is a stain that never washes out of the baggy green. It can't shove this episode down its jocks. Crazy stuff. It takes a lifetime to get a reputation, and a second to lose it.

Rotarians Against Malaria (RAM)

Major players in the global struggle to eradicate malaria have recognised that we have reached a cross-road. Despite the impressive 60% reduction in the annual death toll from malaria since 2000 and the steady stream of countries achieving local malaria elimination progress seems to have stalled.

Many recognise that now is the time for sustained resurgent activity to achieve malaria elimination for all time.

Bill Gates is lobbying for a 2025 date for elimination in SE Asia and the Pacific as well as urging the Australian Government to take leadership to accelerate the programs. The 1st Malaria World Congress will be held in Melbourne (July 1-5 2018) and David Pearson has been appointed to the International Advisory Board for the Conference Committee.

The Congress is shaping up to be a very important and timely meeting at which RAM will be represented, highlighting the success of our ongoing programs in PNG and The Solomons and our commitment to assist Timor Leste to quickly achieve malaria free certification through support from a US \$240,000 Global Grant.

Also of note is the successful fundraising for the Malaria Vaccine Project which is expected to meet the \$500,000 target"
