Meeting Report 9 April

Sergeant Bob Williams opened the meeting with a reflection on the topic of the Rumbek School in South Sudan. The school is now built at a cost of \$90,000, a portion of which was a donation from our Club and also 2 by \$5000 District Grants.

A total of 19 people attended the meeting including a PP of this Club John Bindon.

President Bill Marsh:

Reported that in the Annual Report of The Berengarra School our donation of \$4000 was highlighted which was used to purchase theatre curtains and block out blinds.

Reminded us to bring food items next week for the food table for Eastern Relief at the Volunteer's Forum on April the 18th.

That a profit of \$941 was made at the Bunnings Sausage Stall on Easter Monday.

The film night last Friday was attended by 9 people.

District Assembly will be held on May 20th at Deakin Uni.

Peridot Theatre only has 32 people registered so far. Please book tickets.

Plant a tree will be held on the 23rd of April at 9.30-11.30 at Blackburn Lake.

Other notices:

15 people will be required for the Egg and Bacon Stall at the WHFM next month.

MUNA on the first weekend in May has 15 students from Whitehorse participating at Parliament House.

Although no Sergeant's Session was held the collection raised \$25, and the raffle raised \$59.

There were 2 speaker's sessions for the evening.

The first was IC Robotics who were 4 students who had entered a robotics competition and had spoken at the District Conference.

The robotics competition aims among other things to create an opportunity to develop skills and share a passion for robotics. Also the competition aims to promote STEM education and community involvement.

This group of students won the Chairman's Award at the competition in Sydney and will now attend the world competition in Texas in the next few weeks.

Knox Council had provided them with financial resources to promote their work at 6 schools.

Later that evening P. Bill Marsh presented them with a cheque for \$500 to assist with their travel expenses.



The second speaker was Pat Armstrong (RC Doncaster) who spoke about the East Timor Lighting Project.

Some 3 years ago our Club Committed to support this project.



Pat gave us a background presentation on East Timor and how the people will benefit from solar lighting and some facility to charge some items such as mobile phones. Currently candles and kerosene lamps are used for lighting in remote areas which have safety and health implications for the population.

Rotary is joining forces with the Alternative Technology Association (ATA) to deliver this project.

A typical installation is a 30 W panel, LED lamps, a current regulator, a sealed lead acid battery and a phone charger adaptor.

The goal of this project is to promote literacy and improve maternal and child health.

The next step is, over the next 3 years to install a pilot project of 100 houses in a community. Community engagement will be key to the project which will be managed by the community.

The budget for the project is \$116,432.

This was a very interesting presentation.

Sergeant's Reflection 9 April 2018

As our club is now registered as the project club to finalise the fit out of the Rumbek School in South Sudan I thought I'd briefly re-cap on the project.

It was about 8 years ago when I was working as the Business Manager at Good Shepherd and I employed Sam who had been one of the "Lost Boys of South Sudan" and resettled in Australia. He told me of his dream to build a school in his home village of Rumbek in South Sudan and knowing I was in Rotary, could Rotary help his dream.

It took a few years to get momentum and with a committee of mainly Rotarians and local South Sudanese we had agreement from a local South Sudanese Catholic Diocese to assist in the school construction which using local labour was estimated to cost under A\$100,000.

Sam insisted that the school must have 50% girls enrolled with separate toilets for them so his thinking was directly in line with Rotary's plus there must be a bore and well for the village and school water, as then the women walked miles each day to a river for the village water.

Manningham club took on the project management role with our club in support and we started fund raising. With the help of two District Grants of \$5,000 each, one for the water bore and well and the other for the toilets we have finally finished all the construction and toilet blocks with the Catholic Diocese to provide teachers and management of the school which will have 100 or so pupils starting very soon.

The school will be known as the "Melbourne Rumbek Friendship School."

The project has cost just on A\$100,000 and as the construction phase handled by Manningham club has been completed and as Forest Hill club has been an important part of the whole project, the school committee wanted our club to be the project manager for the fit out to which we have agreed.

We will work in with the local Catholic Diocese as to what these fit out needs will be, as much school equipment can come from their other schools in South Sudan so our role with be mainly coordinating, collecting any funds in our RAWCS account and sending them off.

We can be well pleased with our involvement and I have some photos to send around as well as the story of Sam's earlier life fleeing the war in his country as an eight year old. He and thousands of other young kids walked for two months with many drowning in rivers or being eaten by crocodiles or being shot before finally reaching a camp in Kenya where 20,000 of them spent 12 years or more subsisting on a single bowl of rice a day.

I feel very proud and humble to have had a small part in Sam's later life with him now being a qualified accountant, being Victoria University's "Young Achiever of the Year" a few years ago and now married and a dad and hoping to bring his family in Kenya out to Australia soon.
