MEETING REPORT

Rotary International Convention 27-31 May 2023



PDG Tony Monley was our guest speaker last week and told us all about the RI Convention that all five local districts are hosting next year. A fabulous opportunity for all local Rotarians to see an International Convention on our own doorstep. They are planning for 17,000 plus attendees. We won the right to host in a playoff with London. Two of our winning cards were the attraction of the aboriginal theme and the fact that Victoria is tipping \$5 million into the pot towards the \$13 million cost and a free venue. It will be held in two venues, South Wharf area Southbank and the Rod Laver arena. Jennifer Jones will be the RI Pres and the local host committee will be chaired by Mary Barry with D9810 Tony Monley and D9800 Dennis Shore as the two Vice Chairs. There are 12 other local Rotarians demonstrating their Vocational skills on this committee. They will be looking for 600 local volunteers to help, both Rotarians and Friends of Rotary are welcome. If you register then you can be rostered within the Convention venues while if you have not registered you will be posted outside the Convention venues. You will be able to register to volunteer in June 2022 once this year's Convention has started.

It is expected to draw \$100 million into Victoria. During the day, there will be main speakers and then there will be breakout sessions. Main speakers will give their deliveries twice. Sometimes the second delivery will be a recording. If you register early, you will be at the first, live events.

The evening events programme will start with the usual "cultural" event for Melbourne..... a footy game! on the Friday evening. Saturday evening will be at the Melbourne Museum. Monday evening will be both South Wharf, which has been booked out and will be closed off from the general public with a \$100 for three voucher dinner or home hosting/club hosting. They are looking for volunteer Rotarians and clubs. If you are prepared to take 50 guests then they will provide bus transport and cover the food cost up to a certain value whereas if less than 50 the club would need to organize transport and this will be funded up to a value. For home hosting they want you to live within an hour's drive, they will again cover some out of pockets while hosts are expected to organize the transport. Tuesday evening will be a repeat of the South Wharf and a special Melbourne Cup dinner at Flemington racecourse for up to 1,000.

The other good news is that the three resolutions agreed to by the committee are


- **Climate change**

SPACE4SDGS

Space technology and its applications play an important role in supporting the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) established under the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.


Space4SDGs highlights how outer space can be used for monitoring and achieving the SDGs.

The United Nations, involving more than 190 Member States, has developed the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development in order to address challenges in the form of 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with 169 associated specific targets.

The importance of these roles and their place in the UN (General Assembly resolution [A/RES/70/1: Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development](#)) is recognised and valued.

However, the potential of space in supporting the SDGs is much wider. Space-based services and technologies are key in understanding **climate change** and during the full **disaster management cycle** - only two examples among countless applications to which space can contribute to.

Did you know that last week was International Compost Awareness Week?

‘Soon we’ll all have a **FOGO** (Food Organics Garden Organics) bin - which allows food scraps to be collected, so they can be turned into top quality compost.

Currently about 30pc of us across the country have access to FOGO collection services, but breathe easy, we have now been promised federal commitment to help roll out FOGO to all Australian households by the end of 2023.

However, without FOGO, many of us don’t know how we can reduce the amount of food waste that goes to landfill each week (which can be as much as a third to even half of our household bins), and can wrongly assume that the solution is onerous, smelly and dirty - and that a big garden or outside space is an imperative. Wrong!

It’s easy to start. One suggestion is to join **Share Waste** – it’s a free app that connects people who wish to recycle their kitchen scraps. ‘

The Whitehorse Councils ‘Have your Say’ on waste is, I believe, still available for you to contribute to. 
RCFH BLACKBURN STATION CRAFT MARKET – TRADER OF THE MONTH

Jenny runs a wholesale flower business during the week but at weekends you'll find her at markets selling plants. She goes to six different markets including Rotary markets at Nunawading, Doncaster and Warrandyte. The plants started as a hobby which soon grew into a business. She has a large variety of potted plants but specialises in helibores and would love to talk to you at the market about her passion for her self-propagated plants which probably accounts for half her stock with the other half coming from nurseries in the Monbulk area. Just recently she has downsized her block though keeps the same number of plants for sale. While Spring may be her busiest time as people start to think about what new plants they'll plant out, Jenny says she's pretty busy throughout the year.
