Shining a light on energy efficiency

Whitehorse Council is upgrading more than 850 street lights to energy efficient LED alternatives between March to June end 2021.

Seven thousand lights have already been replaced with energy efficient lighting.

The upgrade will save about 7250 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions during the 20-year life of the lights, equivalent to taking 1686 cars off the road for a year.

In addition to these works, Whitehorse Council has obtained \$897,000 via the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program (Phase 2) to further its energy efficiency street lighting upgrade works.

This grant will be used to upgrade non-standard decorative lighting across the municipality during 2021.

Energy efficiency is a key element in reducing greenhouse emissions and contributing to the achievement of Council's carbon reduction targets. The project will reduce operating costs and improve the public lighting amenity in local streets. The reduction in energy costs will also allow more resources to be directed to other public amenities.

Community Bird Surveys. Have you seen this little bird?

Each year a number of community parkland groups run bird surveys. Checkout their websites for details. Lately a few of our local bird numbers seem down.

The following is from the Blackburn Creeklands group.



Spotted Pardalote

We seem to have fewer this year in the Creeklands. They tend to be heard rather than seen given their penchant for feeding in the canopy of our tall trees.

Despite their high-altitude feeding habits, they nest by tunnelling into the likes of creekbanks. They may have had fewer nesting opportunities if creek levels have risen suddenly and flooded nest sites.

They are also harassed by many other birds including Noisy Miners and Wattlebirds; and their high canopy feeding could be disturbed by Lorikeets.

For 22 years, there has been a knitting corner at the Blackburn Market just opposite the Band stand. They have been selling at markets for 26 years. Everything on sale is hand knitted, mostly acrylic “to keep the price down” Bernadette told me. But they will, and do, make woollen items on order. They generally knit items for new born up to about 4 years of age. They also sell handmade knitted clothes hangers. Jeanne was sitting alongside Bernadette and told me that they do have other knitters at times working at home including one lady of 92. They have a regular turnover of garments and if anything doesn’t sell after a little while they donate it to the op-shop. That is an amazing community spirit.
