Think of the latest floods, bushfires, harsh drought and extreme heat all causing devastation to natural food sources and wildlife habitats.



ESRAG meeting: (Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group). Aaron Schroeder presents on the role of emission offsets on the road to a carbon neutral world. It seems that some in ESRAG want Rotary to get involved with carbon credits and carbon trading. Here we will look at the basics of this complicated issue.

'The role of emission offsets on the road to a carbon neutral world'

Based on independent verifications of more than 300 greenhouse gas statements this presentation will give an overview of how offsets work. This will include activities of carbon capture and storage, oil and gas production, and processing fossil and renewable electricity generation, dairy and beef management, soil carbon sequestration, nitrogen fertilizer management, waste management, and biofuels. Then Aaron will turn to where the markets are at in the world for carbon credits.

ESRAG Rotary Club Carbon Calculator (Oceania)

FAQ: How much Carbon dioxide is being emitted in your Club Meetings?

Rotarians, Rotary Club meetings and Rotary projects all result in carbon dioxide emissions that contribute to greenhouse gases driving climate change.

The ESRAG Carbon Calculator has been developed for the Oceania region to enable Clubs to estimate the impact of their normal meetings and projects.

FAQ: How can I reduce the Carbon Footprint of my Club's activities?

Attending and running Rotary Club meetings and in carrying out most of the projects that we do will result in carbon emissions. However, there are smarter ways to continue doing these important activities that have lower emissions. Once you have estimated your Club's carbon footprint start working on how you can reduce these emissions without affecting the quality of your activities.

FAQ: How can I offset my Club's carbon emissions?

Even after you have reduced the carbon footprint of your Club meetings and projects some footprint is likely to remain. You might like to reduce your carbon footprint to zero or even go further. It is possible to support a carbon sequestration project using public, commercial or even Rotary activities.

INTRODUCTION TO THE CALCULATOR

ESRAG Oceania has commissioned Toitū Envirocare in New Zealand to develop a calculator that can be used by any Club in Australia or New Zealand, to estimate their club's carbon emissions.

Clubs are now able to estimate their emissions from meetings, events and projects (if required), using this calculator, with assurance that the methodology has been designed and developed by an international environmental consultancy.

Clubs which are interested in calculating their annual emissions, or for specific events or projects, can access the calculator by following the process listed on the ESRAG Oceania website. Then complete the **input collection form** which is attached. This will require the collection of data for identified meetings, events and projects. **Input collection instructions** to assist in this process are attached to the form.

The completed **input collection form** should then be submitted to ESRAG at esragcalculator@gmail.com. ESRAG will process the information submitted through the calculator and send the resulting reports back to the Club concerned.

The club concerned will then be entitled (if they wish to) to make the following report, to reference the designers of the calculator and the source of emission factors used:-

'[Club name] has estimated its annual organisational emissions for the measurement period [x-y] from the following sources [x, y, z] using a calculator designed by Toitū Envirocare, which uses emission factors from DEFRA, Ministry for the Environment, Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources and other relevant sources.'

Outback Spirit have been regulars at our market for years and they also regularly sell at the Rotary Club of Mt Waverley and Dingley Farmers markets amongst others. Juleigh and Ian Robins make all their chutneys, sauces, pickles and marinades at their new Dandenong factory. Not only are they delicious but they are gluten and MSG free. Ian and Juleigh are recognised pioneers of the Australian native food industry and have been at the forefront since its inception in 1986. They established Robins Foods in 1997. Ian and Juleigh's vision is to bring Indigenous foods into the mainstream food market and the company is the industry leader supplying the **Outback Spirit** branded range of products to supermarkets nationally in Australia.


In 2000, Ian and Juleigh decided to formalise their relationships with the company's indigenous suppliers and established an ethical supply chain that ensures that benefits from the sale of **Outback Spirit** products go back to the Aboriginal people who are developing their own enterprises based on native foods. They established the Outback Spirit Foundation to further help the Aboriginal people.

Juleigh is an accomplished cook and together with Ian has written three native food cookbooks – Wild Lime (1996 Allen & Unwin) and Wild Classics (2000 Allen & Unwin – with Ian Robins) and Wild Food (2010 Lantern Books, a Viking Books imprint).
