I was the manager of Westpac Nauru House branch in Collins Street in the late 1980's with our major client being the Republic of Nauru and back then they were a wealthy nation, so I was particularly interested in Bronwyn bringing me up to date. The Nauruan President at that time was Hammer DeRoburt and I recall being invited to the grand parties he hosted on the 50<sup>th</sup> floor whenever he was in Melbourne.

Bronwyn in words and pictures presented a very different Nauru in 2012 when she was there working as Religious Liaison Officer for the Salvation Army helping to make the lives of the refugees in the detention camp there, a little better. It was a privilege to hear your address Bronwyn and the number of questions you were asked to answer at the end of your talk represented the interest we all had for your presentation.

Thank you to our members who worked in the cold and wet (well three of us did) at the Whitehorse Farmers' market on Sunday. Well done Warwick, Stuart, Bill and Bob W. Details are later in the newsletter.

Merle Smith is having her cataract operation on Monday so we will all keep you in our thoughts Merle. Ray will be her "seeing eye dog" for a few days and of course, an apology Monday night.

#### LAST WEEK'S MEETING

The meeting had 10 members (including our loaves and fishes (minus the loaves) man Graham) plus our guest speaker, Bronwyn Williams.

Sergeant Stuart opened with a reflection about values and the appalling attitude of Oz tennis brat, Bernard Tomic recently, being disrespectful to his opponent by not trying to return a serve. You aced him Stuart!

We received a letter of thanks from Mitcham Community House for the \$800 donation we gave to their Family Violence program for Cultural training for their staff (and the whole of the House staff and committee) which is essential to retain their status. John McPhee spoke of the President's meeting he attended last Friday night. He spoke of two District policies that were launched, Conflict Resolution that incorporates sexual harassment, bullying and mediation and a Youth Protection policy. John also confirmed the continuation of the chicken and veg main course, the origins of which have been lost in time.

Ray advised that we had been invited by the Institute lecturers last week to look over the new department at Box Hill TAFE so that would make a good vocational visit in the next Rotary year.

Glenys advised that the MUNA committee meet this Wednesday to assess the MUNA weekend and it appears that invoices for the extra \$125 per team for additional Parliament house security haven't been sent out as yet so Warwick is prepared for a cheque for \$250.

We have 5 schools sending awardees to the Citizenship Awards on the 6<sup>th</sup> June. NYSF interviews for 5 applicants will be on the 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Theresa Wang our successful NYSF student has been selected to go to Singapore so seeks suggestions of how to raise the \$8,000 needed.

Stuart advised that we sold 7 entertainment books with \$91 proceeds to go to Hope Katolo School.

Warwick advised that the WFM had 45 stallholders instead of the usual 65 because of it being Mother's Day and the poor weather. Thanks to Warwick, Stuart, Bill and Bob W for representing Forest Hill on the day.

Schwerkolt cottage historical day is 11<sup>th</sup> September and as usual, also the WFM so a big day for us.

Another entertaining sergeant's session with us being asked about "things our mothers told us." Session raised \$20-80 and raffle \$20. Raffle was won by Graham. Bad luck Glenys!

Guest speaker, Bronwyn Williams has a background in education and wanted to change and work in the non profit sector. After re-training she worked for the Salvation Army as their Religious Liaison Office in Nauru helping with the refugees in the camp on Nauru during 2012. Nauru is only 21kms in circumference and in the 1980's had the highest per capita wealth in the world due to their phosphate reserves but that all changed dramatically to now being one of the poorest nations with 80% unemployment. The income from the Australian Government to keep and run the camp there is a major income source. Bronwyn told us about 'the water she swam in', meaning her background didn't prepare her for the very confronting issues she experienced working with the refugees who had nothing. She helped them attain the various religious needs for their services which were mainly Muslim and quickly learned that her "white privilege" upbringing attitude needed changing.

Her working group consisted of people from 12 different countries plus Nauru and the group engaged the refugees into learning to swim, sports, etc. The experience changed her life. On her return home, she was also fortunate to meet up with a few of the refugees she got to know there, when they were allowed into Australia.

Reflection 9 May, 16

We've entered the election phase. Eight weeks of hearing from those who want to represent us – facts, figures, charts, statistics and opinions. Will we hear, or take heed of, comments about values?

What are Australian values? As a regular overseas traveller I often reflect on what sets us, as Australians, apart. I heard our Chef de Mission of the Australian Olympic team say —"it goes against the values of the Australian team." Good on you Kitty Chiller. She was describing Bernard Tomic's behaviour at the Madrid Masters as "appalling." Tomic gave up match point as he stood perfectly still, turned his racquet around and held it by the strings, and made no attempt to return the serve. When asked by a journalist, at the press conference afterwards, about his behaviour he said —"would you care if you were 23 and worth over \$10 million?"

As a tennis player whose fees and taxes have assisted in his junior development, I was furious. As an Australian I cringed. We certainly don't need him representing Australia at the Olympics. When will sports officials get tough on the rogue element? When will people set aside economic arguments and put values and commitment seriously on the agenda? Let's support Kitty who said, "his behaviour goes against every value that all the Olympians live by.'
