## Wendy Austin from Wendy Austin Consulting:

Precis of Wendy's talk (courtesy Wendy)

Wendy spoke from the experiences and learnings gained from being active in the family violence sector since 1978, both on a statewide and regional basis. She was a founding member and later Manager of Brenda House Domestic Violence Service and has long-standing experience in innovative organisational development and broad advocacy, now the focus of her consultancy.

Wendy shared her work with individual women and children and the family violence sector's broader advocacy at Government and bureaucratic levels, providing individual examples, the progression from the 1970's to today, and the outcomes of the Royal Commission into Family Violence Report and Recommendations, March 2016. It has been a long but steady journey over almost 40 years to build government and community awareness of the various elements of family violence.

Definitions of the breadth of family violence, plus a range of statistics, and discussion about the vast range of 'normalities' experienced by women and children and the importance of self worth for both women and men in any relationship, were discussed. The imbalance of power and control in relationships is central to family violence and is where these two elements are most critical.

Wendy believes that 'family violence is everybody's business and everybody's responsibility' and the group considered the current turning point regarding our response to family violence and that there is a growing willingness to seek ways of being part of the solution.

Wendy is obviously used to public speaking and delivered a very informative and enlightening talk about the huge diversity on the subject of Violence Against Women.

She has spent 40 years of her life devoting her time wholeheartedly and tirelessly to assist abused people to "take back their lives" and fight against the destruction of self-worth.

The raffle raised \$40.

# **D9810 Membership Workshop**

Here's a summary of some of the key lessons they took from the evening:

- 1. Meetings need to be interesting, informative and not too bogged down in bureaucracy.
- 2. Whilst it is important to "balance the books", the essential truth is that without attracting new members over time we won't need to worry about fees, as there won't be any members to pay them.
- 3. A planned mentoring program to welcome new members, and retain them, is essential.
- 4. Create a clear sense of belonging with shirts, caps and other marketing tools add to the team feeling.
- 5. Whilst we need younger members, there are lots of 'not-so' young people who are enthusiastic, experienced and have time ... just waiting to see what we do ..... and to be asked!
- 6. We have to embrace public relations and social media in all its forms to advertise to our local community, including younger people.
- 7. That our Club needs to reflect the make-up of their community.
- 8. We need to be more visible in our community with relevant projects. People will want to join when they actually see what we do!
- 9. The undeniable truth from the Rotary Club of Frankston is that they lifted membership from 39 members to a possible 65 members which means that their strategy works.
- 10. That everybody in the Club is responsible for the Club vibe and membership drive.

Please note that every paragraph is important but the last one is absolutely critical
